Swimming Notebook: Long Journey Led Harthoorn Back To Nebraska

The family of six has moved from Norfolk, Nebraska, to Africa and then back to Nebraska. And through most of her life, 19-year-old Kaitlin has been swimming.

And not just in regional meets like this weekend's Yankton Charity Invitational at Memorial Park.

In February 2013, Harthoorn - joined by a Dutch national she had been training with - became the youngest person to ever swim across

Lake Malawi (in Malawi, Africa), the ninth largest lake in the world.

The duo swam across the narrow part of the lake, but it was still a 14-mile journey.

"That's how much she loves swimming," her father Corey said Sunday.

Corey was in a support boat during the race, and although he got seasick midway through, was able to watch his daughter finish.

"I think it actually helped her," Corey joked. "She probably thought, 'At least I'm doing better than dad." Corey, who now works
