Elk Point Man to Head Masons in SD

OACOMA — Don Gray of Elk Point was tapped to head up the more than 5,500 Masons in South Dakota for the next 12 months as their Grand Master, a title that dates back to 1700's England.

Also elected were Mike Rodman as Deputy Grand Master and Yancey Smith as Senior Grand Warden, both from Rapid City. DaNiel Wood of Sioux Falls was elected Junior Grand Warden while Dennis Robinson of Mitchell was elected Grand Treasurer/Secretary.

The keynote speaker was Rear Admiral William G. Sizemore II, U.S. Navy Retired, a third generation Navy veteran and a second generation Naval Aviator. Admiral Sizemore is currently serving as Grand Executive Director of the Scottish Rite, Southern Jurisdiction, at its national headquarters in Washington, D.C. Rear Admiral Sizemore II and his Father, Rear Admiral Sizemore, have the distinction of being the only father and son who have each logged more than 1,000 carrier arrested landings.

Managers Seek Retail Businesses Skills

PIERRE — South Dakota retail businesses support more than 130,000 jobs in the state teaching skills and traits hiring managers across industries seek.

A recent National Retailers Federation (NRF) study states, "Hiring managers from all industries overwhelmingly believe retail equips workers with valuable foundational skills and traits that are transferable to other jobs and recommend that employees include retail experience on their resumes." The study can be found by visiting http://nrf.com and searching "Retail's Value on a Resume."

The study found 80 percent of hiring managers look for the same skills and traits that over eight in 10 current retail employees say they use regularly. These include a personable, respectful nature; ability to work with anyone; ability to take direction; composure; a willingness to step up and ability to multi-task.

"South Dakota's retail businesses foster attributes like work ethic and initiative in their employees which provide them opportunity for career advancement," said Shawn Lyons, South Dakota Retailers Association (SDRA) executive director. "The experience retail employees develop is invaluable in our state's workforce."

The NRF study suggests six in 10 retail employees reported having been promoted and 85 percent report having earned a raise.

SDRA President Dan Tribby of Prairie Edge in Rapid City said, "Our state's retail jobs encourage strong character and teamwork which are both qualities employers seek."

BOARD OF TRADE

CHICAGO (AP) — Grain futures were mostly lower Wednesday on the Chicago Board of Trade.

Wheat for September delivery declined 3.75 cents to \$5.2325 a bushel; September corn was .5 cent lower at 3.7150 a bushel; December oats were 1.5 cents higher at 2.69 a bushel; while November soybeans fell 4.75 cents to \$9.56 a bushel.

Beef and pork were mostly lower on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange. August live cattle was off 1.5 cents to \$1.5032 a pound; August feeder cattle fell 1.8 cents to \$2.2355 a pound; while August lean hogs rose .10 cent to \$.7235 a pound.
