City on the morning of her death. She drove down 454th Avenue to reach the secluded rural boat landing surrounded by trees.

The investigators believe Hummel went to the area to fish but did not initially say if she went alone or with someone. A state parks employee who was monitoring the boat ramp found her body in the water around 2 p.m. that day.

"The area is a popular boat landing (but) she was not using a boat," Howe said at the time.

Law enforcement continues to seek the public's assistance with information that may assist in the homicide investigation. Authorities are asking for the public's help with information on any suspicious activity in the Myron Grove area on June 1.

Howe previously told the Vermillion Plain Talk that

To compete in History Day, students in grades 6-12 have several options to choose from in terms of what kind of project they want to do, which has to correspond with the competition's yearly theme, this year's being "leadership and legacy." Mauch and Walter chose to create an exhibit about General George C. Marshall and the Marshall Plan, which was created in the wake of World War II by Marshall to help the European economy.

The YSD has participated in National History Day for 15 years. Each year, Haar, who also teaches AP Government at YHS, has been the head coach for the local participants.

The History Day program initially started with just

Yankton Middle School, but has since expanded to include the high school.

Haar credits the interest in the program partly due to Drs. Kirk Hackmer and Dan Daily for allowing him to take his AP History class to the University of South Dakota history department, where the students learn how to use a college library and spend the day researching their topics.

"It's a great first step in the learning process," said Haar.

Gathering researching takes a lot of time and effort, as Haar witnessed with Mauch and Walter.

"Their annotated bibliography was 30 pages long," he noted.

For Mauch and Walter, the fun comes from the learning.

"I liked creating the exhibits and bringing history to life," said Walter. "I like being able to fully understand the

"It teaches you better researching and speaking skills," Mauch added. "That will help me out in college."

As for Haar, the benefit is simply seeing the kids improve themselves academically.

"I enjoy seeing the kids grow. It's nice to see them look forward to being critiqued and watching their project develop," he said.

Walter is grateful for all of the support and encouragement him and Mauch have received.

authorities considered the woman's death as a homicide from the beginning because of the circumstances. The investigation remains ongoing with a search for the person(s) responsible for Hummel's death.

Due to the nature of her death, Howe said the search for evidence has been extensive. He noted water depth in the area fluctuates from several inches above sand bars to 12 feet deep.

Law enforcement was on the lookout for a dark sedan with tinted windows and a loud exhaust system. However, authorities were not counting out other vehicles, Howe said.

Howe stressed that officials were also searching for any other vehicles which may have been involved with the case.

He strongly encourages anyone to step forward with information, even if it might not seem directly related to the homicide investigation.

"Honestly, we are looking for information that anybody

would have if they had gone to the Highlines that day, at any time," he told the Plain Talk. "We would like to talk to them, because they may have seen something that they didn't realize was important."

In a previous interview with the Plain Talk, Howe said authorities remain fairly certain that Hummel's death occurred at the boat dock area.

"That is where her car was," he said. "If her car had been parked one place and her body found another downstream, we would be more concerned. But we know she was fishing in that area where it happened."

Meanwhile, Hummel's family and friends continue to mourn her passing and to search for answers in her death. However, they are also celebrating her life and the impact she left on those around her.

Hummel attended Sioux City East High School and graduated in 2004. She continued her education at South Dakota State University,

graduating with a Bachelor of Science in human professions and clinical sciences/human development and family studies/psychology.

She was a member of Ceres Fraternity and Color Guard. After graduating from SDSU, she continued her education at University of South Dakota, graduating with a Bachelor of Science in communications disorders.

She married Tony Hummel on July 30, 2011, at Church of the Nativity in Sioux City.

She was employed by Siouxland Family Center in Dakota City, where she had taught Early Head Start for infants and toddlers since 2013.

Tribe Signs Contract With Marijuana Group

FLANDREAU (AP) — An Indian tribe in South Dakota that plans to start selling marijuana for recreational and medicinal purposes has chosen a Colorado-based company to grow and distribute the drug on the reservation.

The Flandreau Santee Sioux Tribe on Wednesday signed a contract with Monarch America, Inc. The company will be responsible for designing the single, indoor site where the drug will be cultivated and sold.

The tribe earlier this month legalized the growth of marijuana on the reservation's land. Tribal leaders hope to begin selling the drug by Jan. 1.

Leaders estimate the community could earn a monthly profit of \$2 million.

The prospect of pot on tribal land is made possible by a U.S. Justice Department decision in December.

South Dakota Attorney General Marty Jackley has said any changes in tribal laws won't affect any non-Indians or lands.

who might try to get away with abating rules, now we have things set in place for that," Mors said.

As a result, Yankton School District wanted to include nicotine in the prohibited substances along with tobacco.

"Really this change is irrelevant to 99 percent of students," Mors said. "Most of our kids follow these rules already."

The local changes come in response to actions taken in Pierre the last two sessions. The South Dakota Legislature has extended the length of punishment until the student has served his/her number of events from which they are to be suspended. For instance, if a student decides to quit an activity to avoid a suspension, that suspension will carry over to the next season's sport/activity or to the next calendar year until the punishment requirements have been served. Also, if that particular sport/activity season would end before the student has fulfilled the entire suspension, that punishment would transfer into the student's next season's sport as well.

Students are also required to finish that season's sport/activity in its entirety before you can participate in next season's sport/activity. This includes the time before and after serving your suspended calendar days and/or events.

Before last year's changes, South Dakota law had set a 60-day suspension from events for the first offense and a permanent suspension on the second offense.

Currently, on first offense, the student is ineligible to participate in activities sanctioned by the

South Dakota High School Athletics Association (SDH-SAA) for one calendar year. However, this suspension can be reduced to 30 days if the student participates in an assessment with a certified licensed addiction counselor. This involves an initial meeting with the school prevention specialist, a drug/alcohol screen and a once-per-week meeting with that specialist until the end of the suspension period. The student will also conclude his or her suspension with a follow-up meeting scheduled by the counselor.

On the second offense, the suspension may be reduced to 60 days if the student completes an accredited intensive prevention or treatment program.

On the third offense, the student will be permanently ineligible for the remainder of his or her time in high school.

If the student remains violation-free for 12 consecutive months, he/she will receive a "clean slate," meaning each offense after, as long it is not within the 12 month period of the last one, is only subject to the first offense punishment.

"When changes from the South Dakota Legislature come up, we review our own rules and make sure we are up to date with their current wording," Mors said.

"These revisions put out by the Legislature are not much different compared to the rules Yankton School District has already set in place," Mors said. "Officials simply decided to adjust the wording to meet what the legislatures now have changed."

However, state rules do not currently list nicotine as a banned substance, as YHS rules now do.
