depreciate," Fouberg said. "So the summary is," Roby concluded, "No ink to paper, but there's interest.'

Bergquist suggested the commission consider such projects case by case.

But commissioner Tim Dougherty of Sioux Falls, a lawyer, said there should be some criteria to gauge projects in the future so there can be consistent evaluation.

Roby agreed, saying the case by case evaluations would take up a lot of time each com-

mission meeting.
Morris worked to ease the concern. "Very few counties would ever come to this point," he said, noting it took a political conversion by the Yankton County Commission during the past year for the project to gain favor.

about politics but the benefits millions of people are receiving. "This is no longer about a law," he said in the White House Rose Garden. "This is health care in America.

Declining to concede, House Speaker John Boehner of Ohio said Republicans, who have voted more than 50 times to undo the law, will "continue our efforts to repeal the law and replace it with patientcentered solutions that meet the needs of seniors, small business owners and middleclass families." However, he declined to commit to a vote this year.

Several Republican presidential candidates said they would continue the fight, ensuring it will be an issue in

the campaign. Other legal challenges are working their way through the courts, but they appear to pose lesser threats to the law, which passed Congress without a single Republican vote in 2010 and has now withstood two stern challenges at the Supreme Court.

At the court, Chief Justice John Roberts again wrote the opinion in support of the law, just as he did in 2012. His four liberal colleagues were with him three years ago and again on Thursday. Justice Anthony Kennedy, a dissenter in 2012, was part of the majority this time.

Roberts said that to read the law the way challengers wanted — limiting tax credits to people who live in states that set up their own health insurance marketplaces would lead to a "calamitous result" that Congress could not have intended.

Congress passed the Affordable Care Act to improve health insurance markets, not to destroy them," Roberts de-

clared in the majority opinion. Justice Antonin Scalia, in a dissent he summarized from the bench, strongly disagreed. We should start calling this law SCOTUScare," he said, using an acronym for the Supreme Court and suggesting his colleagues' ownership of the law by virtue of their twice stepping in to save it from what he considered worthy challenges.

His comment drew a smile from Roberts, his seatmate

and the object of Scala's ire. Scalia said that Roberts' 2012 decision that upheld the law and his opinion on Thursday "will publish forever the discouraging truth that the Supreme Court of the United States favors some laws over others and is prepared to do whatever it takes to uphold

and assist its favorites." Justices Samuel Alito and Clarence Thomas joined the dissent, as they did in 2012.

Nationally, 10.2 million people have signed up for health insurance under the law. That includes 8.7 million who are receiving an average subsidy of \$272 a month to help pay their premiums. Of those receiving subsidies, 6.4 million were at risk of losing that aid because they live in states that did not set up their own insurance exchanges.

The health insurance industry breathed a sigh of relief, and a national organization representing state regulators from both political parties said the court's decision will mean stable markets for consumers.

Shares of publicly traded hospital operators including HCA Holdings Inc. and Tenet Healthcare Corp. soared after the ruling. Investors had worried that many patients would drop their coverage if they no longer had tax credits to help

pay.

The legal case against nationwide subsidies relied on four words — "established by the state" — in the more than 900-page law.

The law's opponents argued that the vast majority of people who now get help paying for premiums are ineligible for their federal tax credits. That is because roughly three dozen states opted against creating their own health insurance marketplaces, or exchanges, and instead rely on the federal healthcare.gov site to help people find coverage if they don't have it through their jobs.

In the challengers' view, the phrase "established by the state" demonstrated that subsidies were to be available only to people in states that set up their own exchanges.

The administration, congressional Democrats and 22 states responded that it would make no sense to interpret the law that way. The idea was to decrease the number of uninsured, preventing insurers from denying coverage because of "pre-existing" health conditions, requiring almost everyone to be insured and providing financial help to those who otherwise would spend too much of their pay-

checks on premiums. The point of the last piece, the subsidies, is to keep enough people in the pool of insured to avoid triggering a disastrous decline in enrollment, a growing proportion of less healthy people and then premium increases.

because sometimes people just don't have the opportunity to come here at 4 p.m. on a Tuesday to hear us.'

While new for this commission, this isn't the first time in Yankton County Commission history that attempts were made to get input at organized meetings outside of Yankton.

Brian Hunhoff, Yankton County Register of Deeds who was on the County Commission from 1997-2007, told the Press & Dakotan there was a time he made a push to hold full commission meetings outside of Yankton.

"When I first ran for County Commission in 1996, I often heard from rural residents who said commissioners need to pay more attention to the needs of the smaller communities outside of Yankton," Hunhoff said. "I attempted in both 1997 and 1998 to schedule County Commission meetings in each of our five small towns once a year, but most commissioners were against it. They said, 'Nobody would come' or, "It's illegal to hold commission meetings outside of the courthouse.

Hunhoff said the legal issue was put to rest, but the idea was rejected by the com-

mission. 'The legality argument was silenced when the 1999 South Dakota Legislature passed House Bill 1172, clearly stating it is perfectly legal to hold occasional county commission meetings outside of the courthouse," he said. "Marian Gunderson joined the commission in 1999 and she supported the town hall meetings concept. But even with that new law, the two of us were out-voted, 3-2.

Hunhoff then attempted to relaunch the effort a few years later, finding an alternative idea when the attempt stalled again.

"I brought the idea back to the table in 2004," he said. "Commissioner Allen Sinclair was supportive, but we could not get that third vote needed to get them off the ground. As an alternative, Commissioner Sinclair and I attended some local town board meetings

on our own in 2004 and 2005. We went out simply as a pair of commissioners seeking

Hunhoff said having commissioners attend these meetings was fruitful.

'We had good conversations about issues like problem roads, weed and mosquito control efforts, law enforcement coverage, drain age issues, things like that,' he said. "The county was facing some critical building needs in those years, so we also thought it was important to go outside Yankton and personally explain those needs to rural voters.

However, Hunhoff said the meetings were halted soon afterward by the rest of the commissioners.

"Because there were just two of us involved - as opposed to the entire commission — we ran into an issue where certain commissioners complained we were out there making commitments for the entire board. We were not, of course. We simply wanted to be a conduit for concerns from the rural communities. But we risked doing more harm than good on important issues if we continued, so we stopped.'

He said that he's happy to see the current commission working to revitalize the town hall concept.

"I commend the commissioners for pursuing the idea," he said. "It's a great example of open government, and I think these meetings would be successful because the entire commission seems to be on board with the idea. I'm sure the meetings would be well received in the rural communities.

Woods said for the moment, the commission is focusing on other business and will begin working on schedules and formatting for the town halls soon after.

"We're right now elbows deep in budget talks and that has to be done by the first of August," he said. "It seems like the summer months go by so fast. We don't have anything in stone, but we would like to have a couple of commissioners at each town to do a town hall meeting. We're trying to figure out the best day — I don't know if it's a Saturday. I don't know if it's during the week or during

the evening. We're still trying to figure that part out. We'd definitely take some public comments on what would be

best for each community. Woods added and that they'll occur in each town regularly once plans are in

"I would like to do it on a regular basis," he said. "I don't know what regular would mean — if it's every six months, every quarter, once per year — but I think it needs to be done on a regular basis. This is a people's county. This is not an individual's. We need to be out there listening to the people (about) what's going on. We also need to educate them on what's going on and some of the challenges we face whether it's budget talks or some other issues that come up.

Woods anticipated the meetings will take no official commission action.

"I think it'd be more informational, then bringing that information to a normal County Commission meeting at that point in time," he said. "My personal opinion, right now, is to have no more than two commissioners at the town hall meetings, getting information and (bringing) it back to the commission at a later date during a normal meeting.

Hunhoff said, ultimately, this is an idea that will help expand communication between county government and county voters.

"It tells people in the rural areas that their county commissioners care what they think and are reaching out to hear from them," he said. "It's also an opportunity for the commissioners to speak to people who, for whatever reason, have never attended a commission meeting in Yankton. More communication is always a good thing."
