Amateur baseball changed all that. The feedback myself and Sports Editor James Cimburek have received this week in wake of

my amateur baseball column on Wednesday has been far greater than anything we've ever seen. From text messages, to phone calls, to emails and by greater volume, on social media, we've clearly touched on an issue that has never before been brought to this kind of public scale

No, I'm not patting myself on the back and no I don't mean this to come off as self-congratulatory, because plenty of people before me and across many media outlets have written about amateur baseball. Rather I'm amazed at the sheer number of amateur baseball fans we have in this state The issue at hand this week was the dispersal of state tournament bids across the seven Class B

districts in South Dakota, and most specifically the one final spot going to District 4 (Cornbelt League) over District 6 (South Central League). The South Central League, the 9-team league we cover, feels slighted by the Amateur Baseball Association's clear ignorance of logic in deciding these bids

The comments, to be fair, have run the gamut of reactions: From either, why is the South Central League upset, to, wow the South Central League got screwed. But trust, the comments have come, and come, and come. It's clear, amateur baseball - despite all of its issues - remains very popular in South Dakota. It's something everyone in a small town grew up with; either playing the game or watching the game. We can all relate to amateur baseball in some fashion.

And in that way, that's probably the one good thing that can come from this whole discussion. We've got to find a way to ensure amateur baseball survives for another 20 or 50 years. Whether it be fresh leadership perspectives, or a change in the state tournament format, or even a change in the player eligibility rules, this game has got to be willing to adapt.

And right now, it's not. Here's hoping this discussion continues.

that really took a toll on me.' Sandberg quits with a 119-159 career record over parts of three seasons leading Philadelphia. His only full season was in 2014, when the Phillies finished with a 73-89

record. Third base coach Pete Mackanin will take over as interim manager at least through a six-game home-

stand. He's 53-53 in parts of two seasons with Pittsburgh in 2005and Cincinnati

in 2007. "This is my third time as an interim manager and it's not fun,"

Mackanin said. "It's not a pleasant thing to do because you have to make sure you keep the guys pointed in the right direction and at the same time, everybody's feeling a little bit funny. You've got to try to put it behind you as quick as possible and that's not an easy thing to do. A lot of guys really enjoyed playing for Ryno and we

enjoyed working for him. It's not a fun day. The Phillies are expected to hire a new president soon. Signs point toward Andy MacPhail, who led the Minnesota Twins to a pair of World Series titles as general manager in 1987 and 1991.
