# **SDSU Extension Takes Multi-State Approach to Avian Flu Education**

BROOKINGS — In response to the recent Avian Influenza outbreak, SDSU Extension launched a multi-state approach to providing research-based information and resources to families.

"By leveraging our resources and strategically sharing information with families throughout South Dakota, Minnesota and Iowa we are able to provide daily updates and recommendations," said Suzanne Stluka, SDSU Extension Food & Families Program Director of the cooperative project with Iowa State University Extension and University of Minnesota Extension.

Together, Extension staff from the three Land Grant Universities will provide families with information on everything from food safety education and stretching food dollars as the cost of eggs and poultry increases to implementing strategies to manage a family's finances and stress during tough times.

"Avian Influenza has had a very real impact on families — while our SDSU Extension counterparts are working to address producer issues — this group will focus on the families struggling with the human challenges brought on by Avian Influenza," Stluka explained. "Whether that is ensuring families are implementing the proper food safety techniques when preparing eggs and poultry, the loss of employment or dealing with seeing their food budget increase, as eggs, which are traditionally an inexpensive protein source, have more than doubled in price.'

Sharing of resources and information between university extension groups is not a new concept; outreach has been the focus of extension since its establishment within Land Grant universities across the U.S. more than a century ago. And, in this case, Stluka says collaboration is imperative. "Alone, we simply do not have the staff or resources to ensure families receive all the information they need."

# **SD Transportation Program Funding Available**

PIERRE — Letters of Intent forms are now available on the website for the Transportation Alternatives Program (TAP) from the South Dakota Department of

Transportation. The TAP is a grant program that uses federal transportation funds, designated by Congress, for specific activities that enhance the intermodal transportation system and provide safe alternative transportation options.

The TAP was authorized by the Moving Ahead for Progress in the 21st Century Act (MAP-21), signed into law on July 6, 2012. The TAP

builds upon the legacy of the former Transportation Enhancement, Safe Routes to School and Scenic Byways programs by expanding travel choices, strengthening the local economy, improving the quality of life and protecting the environment.

Approximately \$2.1 million is available through this competitive grant process Department of Transportation's project development

Each grant will be for a maximum of \$400,000, although the SDDOT may approve a larger amount for phased projects. The

minimum grant amount for infrastructure projects is \$50.000. There is no set minimum grant amount for non-infrastructure projects and there is an 18.05 percent local match requirement for each project. A full description of the

TAP is available online on the South Dakota Department of Transportation's Program webpage at http:// www.sddot.com/services/ transalt.

The submittal of a Letter of Intent form, found on the webpage, is a mandatory requirement in order to be eligible to submit a full application for funding. The Letter of Intent form

submittal deadline is July 15. 2015. This will be the only call for Letters of Intent for the 2015 Fiscal Year.

Requests for additional information, site visits and/ or meetings on potential projects should be directed to TAP coordinator, Nancy Surprenant, by phone at nancy.surprenant@state. sd.us.

Following the receipt of the Letters of Intent, on-site meetings with project sponsors will be scheduled prior to the Sept. 15, 2015, deadline for full applications.

Federal regulations require anyone applying for a new, renewal or duplicate driver license or identification card to provide the documents listed below (photo copies are not acceptable):

 ONE of the following to prove identity, date of birth, and lawful status: Certified U.S. birth certificate issued by county or state (no

hospital birth-certificates); valid unexpired U.S. passport; Certificate of Naturalization: Certificate of Citizenship; valid unexpired permanent resident card; valid unexpired employment authorization document; foreign passport with valid unexpired U.S. Visa with I-94.

NOTE: A driver license with a gold star in the upper right-hand corner also qualifies as a federally compliant card for identification.

If your name is different than the name on your identity document, you will need to bring additional proof of your legal name. Acceptable documents for proof of legal name change are a certified marriage certificate (issued by a state vital records agency), a certified adoption document, or a certified court order authorizing a name change (such as a divorce decree) If you have had multiple marriages you will need to bring similar documents providing legal proof of each name change. The examiners must be able to trace from your birth

name to your current name. ONÉ document to prove your Social Security number: Social Security card, W-2 Form, SSA 1099 Form, Non-SSA 1099 Form, pay stub (must include name and Social Security number). The regulations do not allow personnel to accept any other document as proof of Social Security number.

· TWO documents to prove your residential address. A parent's proof of address is acceptable for a minor child. Bring two of the documents listed here (each must contain your current address): Utility bill, credit card statement, pay stub or earnings statement, rent receipt phone bill, transcript or report card from accredited school, bank state-
