# Soil Health Field Day Scheduled For July 15 In Pierre

PIERRE - Internationally known soil and crop experts are headlining the Soil Health Field Day at the Dakota Lakes Research Farm on July 14. near Pierre.

The event features "Ray the Soil Guy" Archuleta, Conservation Agronomist, USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS), Greensboro, North Carolina, and Dwayne Beck, Manager, Dakota Lakes Research Center, Pierre. While Archuleta and Beck will focus on cropland soil health, South Dakota conservation professionals Stan Boltz and Jeff Hemenway, both with the NRCS, Huron, will reveal and interpret key soil health indicators for grassland soils.

#### "Our sampling sites across South Dakota are showing drastic differences in the grassland soil's ability to capture and hold precipitation, explains Hemenway. "There are distinct correlations between the species of grassland surface vegetation, use of livestock, the biological activity happening beneath the soil's surface, and infiltration rates. On July 14, we're going to help people visually recognize indicators, then, discuss options for landowners and operators for improving the health of their soil.

Production agriculture is dependent upon the soil's capacity to function properly. Doug Sieck, S.D. Soil Health Coalition Board Member

who ranches near Selby, is one of the event organizers who is hoping to help people further understand natural resources thus adding value to their current agricultural production. "Soil is more than just a medium for growing crops and grass. It is composed of relationships between billions of living organisms. It's amazing how they respond to feeding and management just as a herd of cattle, or a grain crop responds to feeding and management."

Robert Nehl, Corson County; Brian & Jamie Johnson, Spink County; and Bill Nelson, Lake County, will tell their soil management success stories during the Farm and Ranch

Producer Panel.
