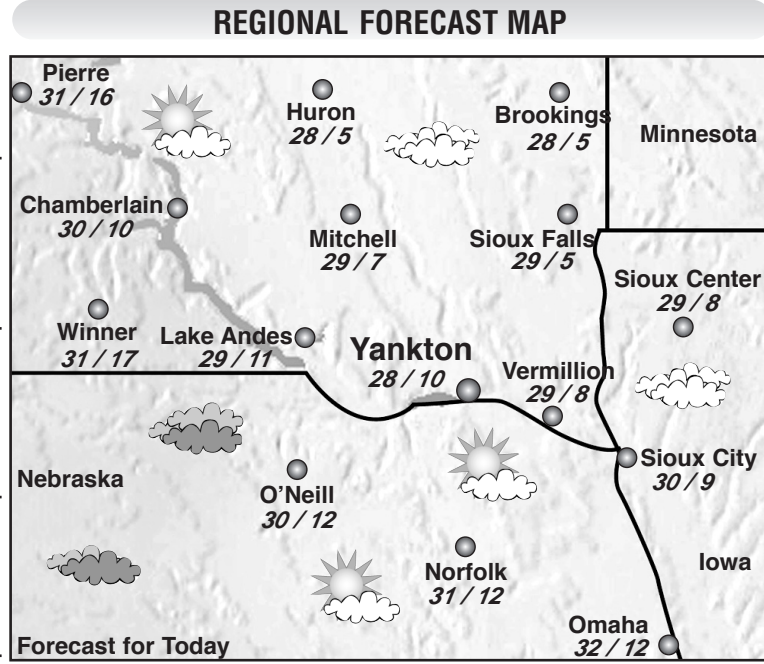

"(South Dakota's) lack of vision on this is going to bite them in the butt," Byrnes said. Paul Blackburn, staff attorney for Plains Justice and former executive director for the Community-Based Energy Development (C-BED) initiative, was also a guest speaker at Saturday's event.

"Independent studies have shown that local ownership of wind energy provides several times the economic benefits to local communities that outside corporate ownership does," Blackburn said.

It's been estimated that wind energy can create thousands of jobs and hundred of millions of dollars in economic growth for South Dakota, and community wind can increase these benefits by more than three times, according to studies by Windustry.

"In South Dakota, every project since 2003 has been owned by outside companies," Blackburn said. He added that local ownership of wind energy can also help avoid some of the community conflicts that can develop when outside investors control the projects.

According to studies by Windustry, the states that have seen the most success in community-based wind energy development have one thing in common: support from the citizens of the state.

"Pick up the rock and shine the light under there, we have every right to know what's going on when policy is being negotiated," Byrnes said.

Blackburn added that it's the citizens' responsibility to learn what they can do to be involved, and know what their options are for participation.

"It comes down to policy and the support of our legislators," Byrnes said. "Citizens need to give (legislators) a boot in the rear and hold them accountable to all their promises."

He added that citizens need to overcome the influence of public power lobbyists.

"Tell your elected officials that you support community wind energy and want South Dakota to be a wind energy leader," Byrnes said. "One citizen can change the law."
