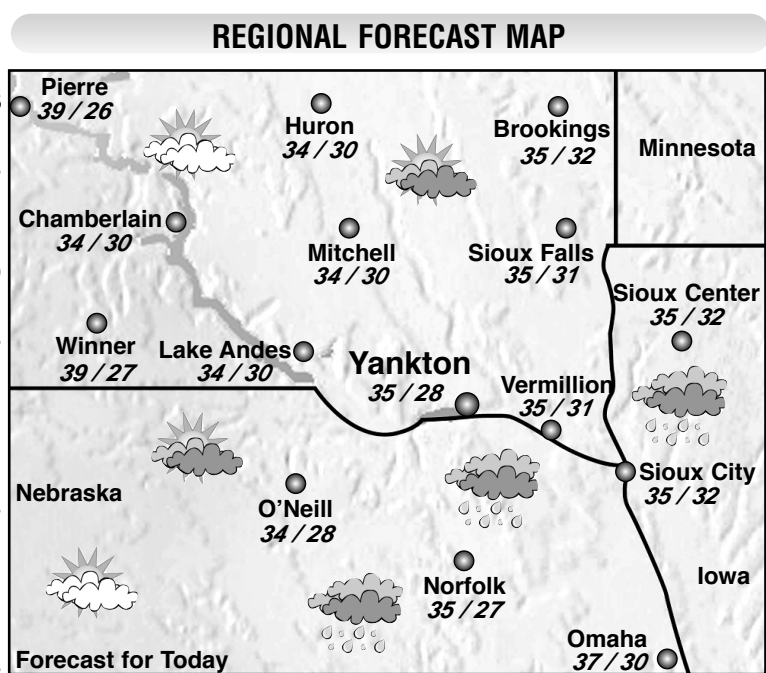

75 YEARS AGO

Tuesday, March 12, 1935
A clean-up campaign against alleged wide-open gambling conditions in Yankton was in prospect today. Declaring the time has come for stamping out the so-called "liberalism" toward law observance which has existed in the city and county since the repeal of federal prohibition, State's Attorney John E. Walsh announced his office would press a campaign to clean up these conditions in the city and county.

Gov. Tom Berry declined to comment further on the Morrill packing plant in Sioux Falls, pending arrival of a committee of non-union workers reported seeking the executive's aid in returning to their jobs.

50 YEARS AGO

Saturday, March 12, 1960
Three chief phases of "family life" will be emphasized at Yankton's annual Chamber of Commerce Home Show next Tuesday and Wednesday. They are house and home, yard and garden, and park and playground.

A heavy guard of state troopers and sheriff's deputies surrounded Eleanor Roosevelt Friday night after an anonymous telephone caller threatened to kill her in Bradenton, Fla. The late president's widow was there to address a Democratic party rally.

It would cost \$649,403 to build the all-weather track and football field east of Yankton Senior High School. After hearing that figure Monday night, the Yankton School Board tabled action on it for 30 days pending a public hearing.

an 84 percent probability of major flooding near 16 feet at Scotland.

"The chances of major flooding are very high on every gauge on the James River," Temeyer said.

JRWDD general manager Darrell Raschke foresees area flooding until at least early July, with Yankton seeing the water six to eight weeks after upstream sites. Normal spring rains will worsen the situation, he said.

The snowpack in the James River basin, particularly in the Yankton area, remains loaded with water, Temeyer said. The situation creates a tremendous flood potential, he said.

"The National Weather Service put out its snow-water equivalent on Wednesday. You are looking at 4 to 6 inches around here," he said.

"Based upon current snow-water equivalent conditions in the James River basin upstream of the reservoirs, the volume of runoff is expected to be in line with the runoff expected in 1997."

An area of low pressure will remain over the area through today (Friday). Rainfall amounts will total around one inch through today, elevating flooding concerns associated with the spring melt.

The combination of recent rains and above-freezing temperatures in the James River basin has caused the snowpack to begin quickly melting and running off. Additional rainfall of 0.25 to 0.5 inches will further accelerate the runoff through this weekend.

On a positive note, the snowpack near Jamestown, N.D. —

which feeds the James River — is apparently not headed for the same levels as last April when melting started, Temeyer said.

In anticipation of flooding, weekly conference calls are being held between the JRWDD and the South Dakota Office of Emergency Management (OEM).

During Thursday's meeting, Yankton County residents — including county commissioners Al Sinclair and Bruce Jensen — renewed their plea for debris removal to ease James River flooding.

Cleanup efforts should focus on the southern end of the river near Yankton, said Terry Fielder, who lives near Chris Road east of the WNAX tower.

"It seems, if you want to clean up the Jim River, you would take up the mouth of the river," he said. "It looks like a war zone down there. Nothing has ever been done. If you want to drain a river, clean up the hole at the end."

Fiedler noted the Corps builds nearby sandbars for two endangered species of birds, the least tern and piping plover.

"It seems, if they have the equipment and money for birds, they can take care of this (debris removal)," he said.

Jensen agreed. "You want a free-flowing river. Clean out the debris," he said.

Sediment remains an ongoing problem for the lower James River, Sinclair said.

"Since the 1980s, there have been problems with sediment," he said. "The landowners try to save their individual properties."

Sinclair recommended another JRWDD meeting in Yankton. He noted the full board room for Thursday's special meeting.

"As seen by the public interest, it would be good to have a meeting in Yankton," he said. "Whenever the James River board has a meeting in Yankton, you have a full room."

Raschke said he plans to appear at Tuesday's regular meeting of the Yankton County Commission. At that time, he will bring a joint resolution for the JRWDD and County Commission, asking the Corps to look at problems with the James River mouth at Yankton.

"In the past, I have flown over the mouth and have seen the mess," Raschke told the Press & Dakotan. "We will see if we can work with the Corps and county. We'll know more when we meet with the County Commission."

Other discussion at Thursday's JRWDD meeting focused on finding an organization to partner on sediment and other river issues. Area residents also asked about flooding problems created by bridges.

After the meeting, Fiedler told the Press & Dakotan he remained frustrated at the action — or lack of it — on the lower James River. He feared a repeat of 1997 flooding, which hit his area.

"There are too many factions and government entities. Who is in charge of this mess?" he asked. "I have heard the facts. I just don't like the answers."

Raschke told the Press & Dakotan he foresees extensive flooding throughout the basin.

"We know there is a lot of water, and we know it's coming. We just try to move as much water as we can," he said. "It's a typical James River flood."

Raschke warned area residents to prepare for the long haul, with flooding expected to last into summer.

"Don't plan any big Fourth of July picnics next to the river," he said.
