Broadway/Highway 81 corridor to the Lewis and Clark Lake area along Highway 52.

"We're hoping to get Eighth Street west of Broadway done early because of the lake traffic that comes on as the summer continues," Kuhl said.

The 30-day contract for completion is expected to commence in late May, he added.

For many of the major projects, there will be a pre-construction meeting where the public can ask questions about how the work will affect them.

"It is a disruption to these neighborhoods," Kuhl said. "But we hope that we're leaving them with a new and improved situation."

Many of the projects have been bid out already with positive results.

"They've all come in underneath the estimate," said Brad

Moser, a civil engineer for the city.

As winter transitions into spring, Street Superintendent Dave Leyden said his staff has been busy. Currently, two crews scour the city on a daily basis filling in potholes.

"Right now, we're putting in some cold (asphalt) mix temporarily until the hot plant gets going," Leyden said.

He added that many non-paved alleys are "mud holes," but there is nothing his staff can do to improve them until they dry.

"If we put a heavy piece of equipment on there, it totally destroys them," Leyden said. "We tell people to be patient. We know (those alleys) are a mess, but there's just not a lot we can do with them right now. If we go in there, we can make them even worse."

Kuhl noted that most of the major projects this summer will require street closures, so residents should be alert and choose alternative routes when they get under way.

"Patience will be a good thing to have," Leyden said.

"I don't really have the room at home to have a garden, and this was an opportunity to have a couple of plots," he said. "The dog park right close by helps a lot because I take my two dogs and my youngster, and my wife goes as well, so it works out pretty well, other than driving across town."

Merchen said that the low cost for the plot, with water included, makes the garden a great value for his family.

"I think at a minimum we got out there five days a week last year," he said. "We are looking forward to getting back out there this year. My wife already has plants started that we will plant later this spring. It is just a big advantage and helps a great deal to have the water available there. You go through a lot of water, and it saves you quite a bit if you compare it to doing it on your

In the economy we are in, being able to supplement your food budget with fresh grown items both helps reduce their budgets and helps them eat healthier."

own nickel."

The cost of a garden plot is just \$15 per season, and O'Connor knows that the opportunity would not be there were it not for the generosity of the community.

"I would like to say that this has been a collaborative effort with the City of Yankton as well as many other groups and individuals with funds provided largely by a grant from the Avera Community Service Fund," O'Connor said. "With the way people have responded, we are already working with the city to

see about adding additional plots this year and looking at other possible locations in the future."

Looking forward to this planting season, Merchen said his family will focus on planting tomatoes, zucchinis, cucumbers and peppers. He added that he was very impressed with the gardens he saw last year.

"There were a lot of people who grew twice as much as we did," he said. "There were just great examples of gardening expertise on display, and I expect them to be better this year because this is the second year the ground has been broken up."
