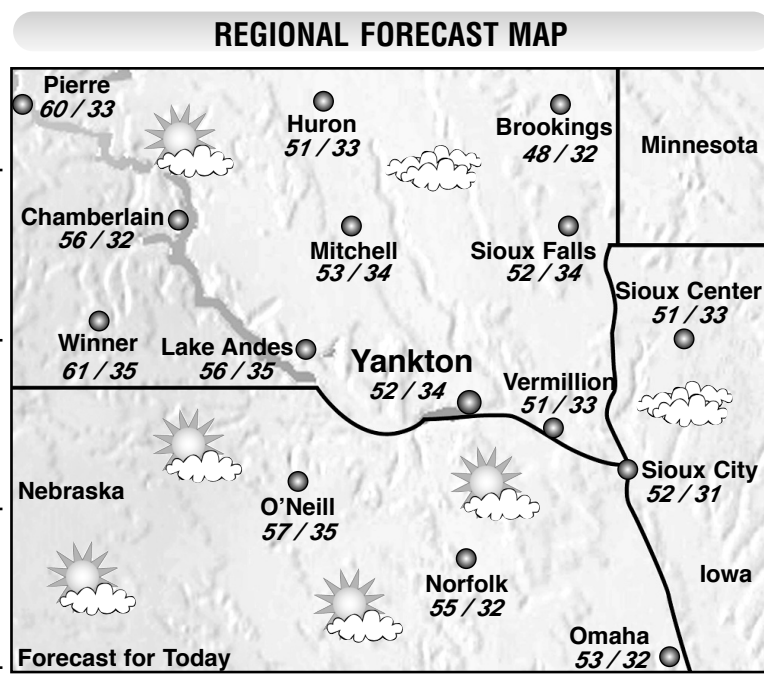

High Schools Striving For 'Gift Of Life' Scholarships

The Siouxland Community Blood Bank announces the schedule for mobile blood drives in April 2010. More than 100 blood drives are scheduled throughout the tri-state area during the month.

April is a busy month at the Siouxland Community Blood Bank as many schools are holding their final blood drive of the school year. Additionally, the schools will be determining their eligibility requirements for their recipients of the "Gift of Life" scholarship offered on behalf of the Siouxland Community Blood Bank.

"We began the scholarship program four years ago as a way to recognize these schools that do so much for our organization," said Heather Marreel, director of recruitment. "This year, we are anticipating almost 100 schools receiving a scholarship."

The amount of the scholarship is determined by the number of blood drives the high school holds during the year as well as the total number of registered donors at all of those blood drives. "Scholarship amounts can range from \$100 to almost \$1,000," said Marreel. "It's really up to the school and the students to determine how much they earn."

The student receiving the scholarship is selected from the school's own criteria. The student does not have to be a blood donor. In 2009, 32 students received scholarships to help with their post-secondary education.

The funds used to support the scholarship program are raised at the Siouxland Blood Bank's "Drive For Life" golf tournament held each summer. This year's tournament is scheduled for Monday, June 7, at Whispering Creek Golf Course in Sioux City.

the impact of the flooding looks like at each stage level," Dangel said. "It should be a really good investment."

Installation of the gauge and maintenance for the first year will be approximately \$30,000. The U.S. Geological Service will pay half of that cost. The remaining \$15,000 will be split between Yankton County and the James River Water Development District.

Darrell Raschke, manager of the JRWDD, seemed confident his board would approve the expenditure during an upcoming meeting.

"This is really important," County Commission Chairman Bruce Jensen said. "We need it."

The motion for the expenditure was approved in a 4-1 vote, with Commissioner Bill Tamisiea dissenting.

"I think it's appropriate (to do this), but I think it's another sign of poor planning — especially if we've talked about it for two years," Tamisiea said after some debate about where within the county's budget the money would be found for the project. "It should have been a budget item."

Also in conjunction with the JRWDD, the County Commission approved a resolution requesting the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers to conduct an investigation into the feasibility and benefits of removing trees and other debris from near the mouth of the James River east of Yankton.

Alternatively, they will request that the Corps do a higher-than-normal spring pulse at Gavins Point Dam. Gerry Koster, who has lived along the James River for years, recalled that when that was done in conjunction with a high James River flow in the mid-1990s, it created a swirling motion that cleared out a good deal of the debris.

Dangel also took the opportunity to inform the commission that the James River is expected to crest in this area late next week and could break the previous flood stage record set in 1997. Raschke said the record was broken Monday near Mitchell.

The county will be prepared for that scenario, Dangel said. "We've got sandbags filled, stacked and on pallets," he stated. "We've still got about 8,000 sandbags that could be filled if needed. We're watching river levels on a daily basis and trying to stay ahead of everything."

In other business Tuesday, the commission:

- discussed funding options for replacing a deteriorating pipe that connects two drainage ditches in Gayville;
- instructed staff to get bids for repairing the roof of the Yankton County Ambulance Building, which has been leaking water;
- agreed to give county employees the afternoon of Good Friday off; and
- received a report from Register of Deeds Brian Hunkhoff about the activity that took place in his office during 2009.
