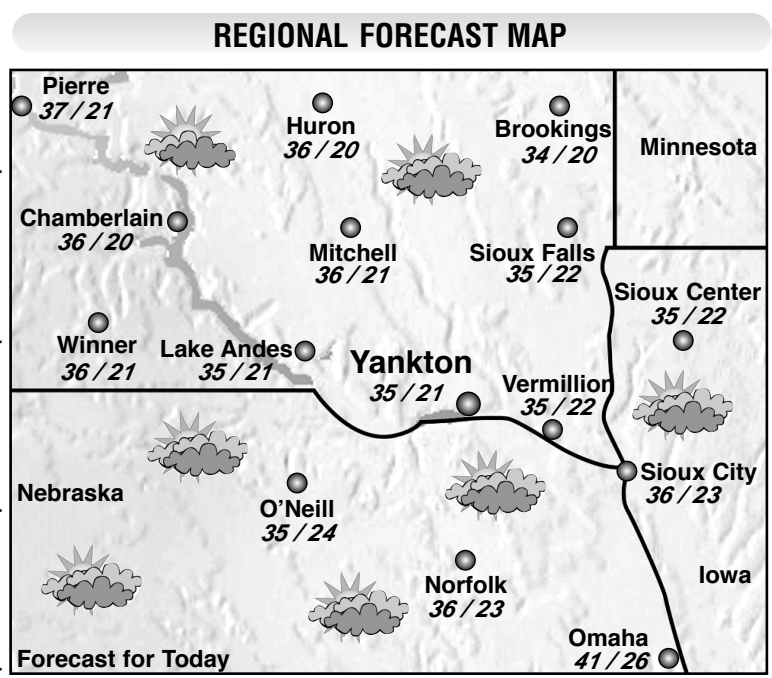

Dial has just begun to meet with current mall tenants to discuss the plans and is trying to recruit new ones, especially restaurants.

"There is a lot more activity in the market today for tenants — especially those looking to get in now when rent is down," Kennedy said.

Kennedy said the economic climate is still making things difficult, but he is optimistic progress can be made this year.

"We're talking to people every day," he said. "If we had (a new tenant) who signed up, I think something could happen before the end of the year."
