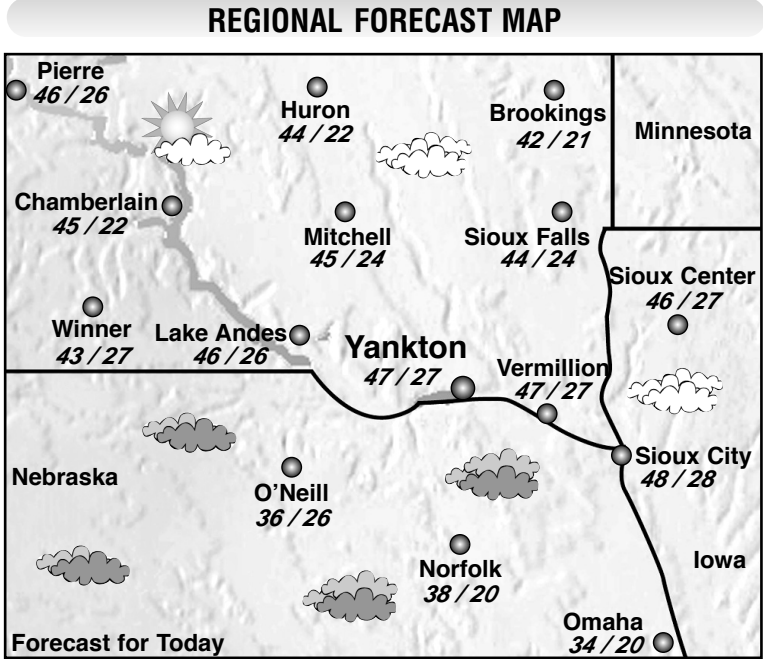

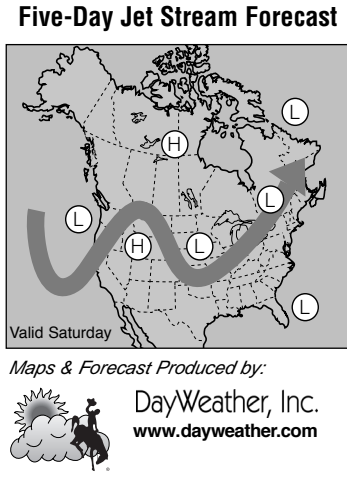

Building Bridges Conference On March 26

VERMILLION — The University of South Dakota is hosting the 13th annual Building Bridges Conference at the Muenster University Center on Friday, March 26.

Sponsored by the USD Clinical Training Program and USD Admissions Office, the daylong event entitled, "O'yate O'kiciyapi: People Helping One Another," focuses on several topics of support and resiliency within the Native communities. Participants will have an opportunity to examine the importance of emotional and psychological support in Native communities, including coping with traumatic stress by Elizabeth Boyd, professor of psychology and director of the Psychological Services Center at USD. Additional presentations include "Active Listening" by Jerry Jacobs, Ph.D., USD professor of clinical psychology and director of the Disaster Mental Health Institute at USD, and Gene Thin Elk, director of Native American Services at The U and "Lessons Learned from Last Year's Participants." In addition, a variety of USD departments, programs and organizations will be showcased at an "Information Fair" during the conference.

Officials: House Fire Began In Basement

The Yankton Fire Department and insurance investigators have determined that a blaze which destroyed a home on Highway 52 west of Yankton Tuesday morning originated in the basement. The fire is being blamed on a hollow core door installed too close to a boiler used for heating the home when the basement was remodeled. The remodeling is believed to have taken place prior to the current owners purchasing the home more than 17 years ago.

Wood changes over time, and the ignition temperature, is reduced as it ages and is repeatedly heated and cooled.

Deputy Fire Chief Larry Nickles says the amount of water in the basement when firefighters arrived was calculated to be about 8,000-10,000 gallons before the department ever applied water on the fire. This was caused by a the excessive heat allowing the solder joints in the water pipes to come apart, and flowing water and may have slowed the progress of the fire for up to 10 hours.

Damages caused by the fire may total up to \$250,000 or more.

CHICAGO BOARD OF TRADE

Agriculture futures were mixed Monday on the Chicago Board of Trade.

Wheat for May delivery rose 2.75 cents to \$4.865 a bushel, while May corn lost 3.75 cents to \$3.7075 a bushel and oats for May delivery dropped 6 cents to \$2.185 a bushel. May soybeans climbed 6.75 cents to \$9.685 a bushel.

Meanwhile, beef futures slid and pork futures traded mixed on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange.

June live cattle edged down 1.05 cents to \$4.07 cents a pound; May feeder cattle shed 1.07 cents to \$1.053 a pound; June lean hogs added 0.28 cent to 82.85 cents a pound; and May pork bellies fell 0.32 cent to 93.15 cents a pound.
