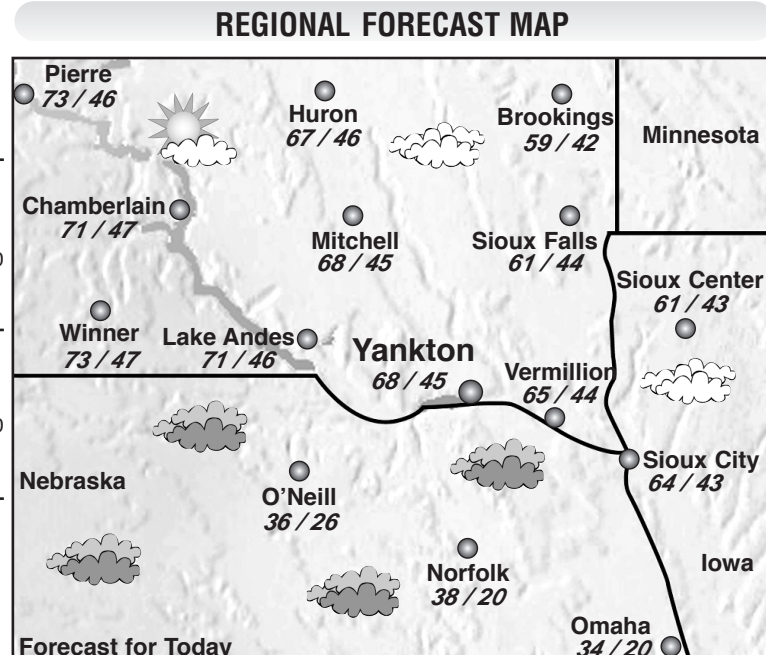

Nebraska Intelligence Center Fights Terror, Crime

OMAHA, Neb. — Nebraska's intelligence-sharing center is one of the state's newest tools to fight terrorism and crime because it improves coordination between agencies.

Lt. Gov. Rick Sheehy says the state's efforts to prepare for terrorism have also helped improve the way it responds to other emergencies.

Nebraska's intelligence-sharing center opened last May, and state officials are working to link more law enforcement and emergency departments into it. The U.S. Department of Homeland Security recently assigned an officer to the center.

Dawn Scalici, deputy under secretary for intelligence and analysis with the Department of Homeland Security, said she thinks the center can be a focal point in the state.

"What we're working very hard to do across the United States is build up good strong baseline capabilities," she said.

The Nebraska center is part of a network of 72 nationwide, known as fusion centers. Every state has one, and 22 additional centers are located in major urban areas.

Nebraska's center is run by the State Patrol, and the Omaha and Lincoln police departments have signed agreements to participate.

Scalici said she hopes the fusion centers will develop analytical expertise and be able to spot threats early.

The ACLU nationally has criticized fusion centers as a secretive "domestic intelligence network" tracking innocent citizens.

Laurel Marsh, executive director of the Nebraska ACLU, said she's not aware of any specific problems with the state's center, but the ACLU worries about the potential for problems.

"We want to make sure there are appropriate safeguards put into place on the sharing of information to make sure people's privacy is respected," Marsh said.

Iowa Man Convicted Of Rape In S.D.

ELK POINT (AP) — An Iowa man has been convicted of raping a woman at a mutual friend's 21st birthday party in South Dakota.

A Union County Circuit Court jury deliberated three hours Wednesday before finding Christopher Jones guilty of two counts of third-degree rape.

Union County state's attorney Jerry Miller says Jones, of Sioux City, Iowa, raped a 23-year-old woman twice on Oct. 19, 2008, at a Dakota Dunes residence. The victim told authorities she was drunk and passed out, but twice awoke to find Jones assaulting her.

Jones is free on \$10,000 bond until sentencing. He faces up to 50 years in prison.

Charges Faced After Alleged Drinking Party

SIoux FALLS (AP) — A Sioux Falls woman is suspected of giving alcohol to a 15-year-old girl who wrecked her car after leaving a party.

The Minnehaha County sheriff's office says Nancy Nold faces charges of furnishing alcohol to a minor and contributing to the delinquency of a minor.

She was arrested after the Dell Rapids teen rolled her car into a field about 5 a.m. Sunday. The teen was taken to a Sioux Falls hospital with non-life-threatening injuries. She also faces charges.

The sheriff's office says the girl had left a drinking party at Nold's home. Another juvenile and six people ages 18 to 20 were also at the party.

No number was listed for Nold.

Volunteers Fortify Barriers Around S.D. Lake

WATER TOWN (AP) — Volunteers continue to fill sandbags and fortify flood barriers around Lake Poinsett.

The lake's water level has been high for weeks. Property owners worry that if the lake's ice-covering breaks, waves of water will crash into houses and buildings.

A United Methodist Church camp is among the properties being fortified against flood waters. More than 100 volunteers turned out this weekend to help.

Camp director Steve Foss says there have been several renovations and upgrades there over the past several years and it would be a shame to see that destroyed.

Cathy Stilwell came from Sioux City, Iowa, to help her elderly parents protect their lake house. She says her family filled 600 or so sandbags Friday and Saturday, and boarded up the front of the house.

Oglala Sioux Plan Neb. Tribal Nursing Home

WHITECLAY, Neb. (AP) — South Dakota's Oglala Sioux Tribe plans to build a nursing home across the Nebraska border near Whiteclay.

The tribe's consultant, Gary Ruse, says there are about 200 tribe members in Midwest nursing homes who want to return to the Pine Ridge Indian Reservation.

Most of the tribe's land is in South Dakota, but Ruse says Nebraska has been more cooperative in the tribe's efforts to building the facility.

The 60-bed nursing home is expected to cost \$10 million. The tribe hopes to break ground in late spring or early summer, with completion in fall 2011.

Ruse says it'll create 80 to 100 jobs.

UNMC Gets \$1 Million For Heart Center

OMAHA, Neb. (AP) — The University of Nebraska Medical Center's College of Nursing has received \$1 million to develop a new center for heart research.

The five-year grant comes from the National Institute of Nursing Research.

It will be used to create and fund a Healthy Heart Center, which will expand the college's research of heart disease in rural Nebraska.

UNMC professor Carol Pullen says Nebraskans in rural areas are at a higher risk for heart disease and doctors need ways to encourage them to adopt healthy lifestyles.

Grasshopper Outlook Strikes Fear On Range

NEWCASTLE, Wyo. — Grasshopper infestations have taken on mythic tones here on the arid prairie of northeastern Wyoming — they blanket highways, eat T-shirts off clotheslines and devour nearly every scrap of vegetation on ranches and farms.

The myth may come closer to reality this summer than at any time in decades in several states in the West and the Plains.

A federal survey of adult grasshoppers last fall indicated that parts of Wyoming, Montana, South Dakota, North Dakota, Nebraska and Idaho could face costly grasshopper infestations this summer.

Ranchers and farmers as well as federal and municipal pest control agencies are praying for well-timed cool and wet weather to stifle the young grasshoppers when they hatch around May and June.

In the meantime, they're scrambling to line up the millions of dollars it will cost to battle an outbreak with aerial insecticide.

"They're grass eaters," said Tom Wright, a rancher near Newcastle in northeast Wyoming
