Neb. Landowners Yet To Be Paid For Rail Trails

OMAHA, Neb. — Nebraska landowners whose property was taken a century ago for railroad lines and later converted to recreation trails have yet to be compensated for the loss, despite a federal judge's 2008 ruling that paved the way for payments.

A final decision still could still be years away, as property owners and the federal government try to sort about 3,000 land parcels that were taken for rail lines in the late 1800s and early 1900s, said Cecilia Fex, a Washington-based attorney representing the landowners in a class-action lawsuit against the government.

Fex said she and government attorneys continue to work on a method to identify eligible landowners and calculate compensation. The value of the property is still being assessed, and the amount each land owner could get will differ.

"It should definitely vary by the size of the property and the market value of the property at the time of the taking," Fex said.

U.S. Department of Justice spokesman Wyn Hornbuckle said

he couldn't speculate on a time frame but both sides are committed to resolving the case as soon as possible. He declined further comment, since the case was

A federal judge ruled in January 2008 that the now-abandoned land should have been returned to owners, not handed over for rail trails, under the terms of some easements granted to the railroads for construction and use of rail lines. Rail trails are recreation paths created on former rail lines. The ruling applies to private land that was used by railroads and later converted into rail trails, which the judge said violated fed-

The lawsuit, first filed in 1998 in Kansas and transferred to Nebraska in 1999, covers 15 rail trails in 22 Nebraska counties roughly 500 miles of abandoned rail lines.

In the lawsuit, the Nebraska landowners argued that a federal law converting the abandoned easements into recreational trails was a violation of their Fifth Amendment rights, which prevents the taking of private property for public use without due process or just compensation.

Daugaard Signs Youth Concussions Bill

PIERRE (AP) — Gov. Dennis Daugaard has signed into law a measure that sets up new guidelines for handling possible concussions in youth sports in South Dakota.

The law will require the South Dakota High School Activities Association and the state Education Department to develop guidelines to inform and educate coaches, athletes, parents and others of the nature and risk of concussions. Those guidelines would explain the need to get a medical diagnosis or treatment when an athlete is suspected of having sustained a concussion.

Coaches in all sports sanctioned by the High School Activities Association would have to complete a training program each year.

Any athlete showing signs of a concussion would have to undergo an evaluation before returning to play.

Gonorrhea Rates Spike In Western S.D.RAPID CITY (AP) — State health officials say gonorrhea rates in

the western one-third of South Dakota are more than four times as high as they are in the eastern one-third of the state.

Officials say 11 western counties have reported 36 cases of the sexually transmitted disease this year, for a rate of 18 cases per 100,000 people. There have been 19 cases reported in the more populous eastern part of the state, for a rate of 4 cases per 100,000. There were 64 reported cases statewide in February, up from 43 in

The director of the Northern Plains Tribal Epidemiology Center tells the Rapid City Journal that officials are worried about increasing rates of gonorrhea in the western counties that are predominantly reservation communities.

Lincoln: Incumbent Mayor Faces 1 Opponent

LINCOLN, Neb. (AP) — Incumbent Chris Beutler faces one opponent in the upcoming Lincoln mayoral race.

The Lincoln Journal Star reports Beutler is the lone Democrat to submit paperwork to the Nebraska Secretary of State. Republican

Tammy Buffington is also running.

Beutler is a former state senator and served 24 years in the state Legislature. He waged a failed campaign for governor in 1986. The 66year-old is completing his first term as mayor.

Buffington is new to the political scene. The 49-year-old runs an insurance business and is a fitness instructor.

The primary election is April 5 and the general on May 3.


