week, the league also raised funds through koozie sales (which were purchased with money from an anonymous donation) and collections throughout Yankton, Cunningham said. She especially wanted to thank the Casey's location on Broadway for accepting donations for the league.

"They had \$825 from the bucket that was placed there for donations from the community, so that was huge," she said.

While the original donation made to the Avera Cancer Center Foundation on Feb. 19 totaled \$2,500, the league decided to continue its fundraising during the state dart tournament it attended last weekend. With those efforts, the donation will now be closer to \$3,000, Oliver said.

"It's amazing to see the dedication when you get this group of women together and they're fighting for a cause and fighting against cancer," he said. "I'm proud of them and I'm proud of the Yankton community."

In addition to raising more money throughout the state tournament, the league was also successful in using the event to relay its message to others.

"With the awareness of what we're doing in Yankton, it's something that other towns may start doing for their own community to raise money, too," Cunningham said.

Oliver said the Pink Ladies' idea has also spread throughout Yankton, as he knows several pool players that are looking to start a similar league.

"It's kind of like a virus that's spreading, but it's a good virus," he said. "It's helped a lot people who need it."

Oliver said the Pink Ladies Dart League is always looking for more members, and he encourages those interested to join, no matter what their skill level is.

"Some players, especially the younger players, are intimidated by the better dart players because there a lot of good dart players in Yankton, and they're afraid of joining the league," he said. "Don't be afraid. Join in on the fun for a cause."

Oakland players' parents and the fans. It's been a lot of fun each year."

The Oakland cheering section has become well known at the Summit League tournament. The Golden Grizzlies draw a respectable fan following, and the school brings a high-powered band, cheerleaders and dance team. The "Golden Grizz" fans who make the 15-hour trek from the Oakland campus to Sioux Falls form a loyal and hardy group, Gross said. They have had plenty to cheer about at the tournament, making the long trip worthwhile, he said.

Oakland has reached the Summit League tourney finals all three years in Sioux Falls. OU lost the 2009 Summit League championship game, but rebounded with the 2010 and 2011 tourney crowns and berths in the NCAA tournament.

Gross, a business professor at Mount Marty College in Yankton, sees this weekend's games as his only chance to catch the Oakland teams in action.

"My schedule is an issue," he said. "And I teach Tuesday nights, so I won't be able to see the championship game if the Oakland men make the finals."

The Summit League tournament isn't the only time that Gross finds himself an outsider in his home state. Last

Saturday, he joined a small pocket of Oakland faithful during the double-header against the University of South Dakota at the DakotaDome in Vermillion.

"At the Summit League tourney, there will be quite a few more Oakland alumni and school people than there were at the USD game," he said.

Oakland's basketball appearances in Gross's backyard have rekindled his interest in his alma mater. He is one of the school's earliest graduates, earning a bachelor's degree in 1969 with a double major in English and social studies education.

"I was looking for a school that was challenging in the classroom," he said. "My sister was attending Mount Holyoke (in Massachusetts), and her boyfriend from Detroit said I should go to Oakland. I applied and was accepted. I went there without ever seeing it."

Oakland University was created in 1957 when the late Alfred and Matilda Wilson donated \$2 million and their 1,500-acre estate to Michigan State University to start a new college in Oakland County.

Named Michigan State University-Oakland, the college opened in 1959 with 570 students. Its charter class graduated in 1963 with 125 students receiving diplomas. The college's name changed to Oakland University in 1963.

In 1970, the Michigan Legislature granted autonomy to Oakland, and Michigan's governor appointed the college's first board of trustees.

When Gross arrived on campus in the 1960s, the school enrolled about 3,300 students. Today, more than 18,000 students attend classes at OU, and the alumni number more than 80,000.

Oakland started as a liberal arts college and developed business and engineering programs, Gross said.

"There was tremendous diversity on the campus," he said. "There is so little diversity in South Dakota, which made attending Oakland that much more interesting. I was in awe of the kids who grew up in Detroit and other urban areas of Michigan. But ultimately, they were no different than me."

After graduating in December 1969, Gross substitute taught for a semester. He returned to Yankton in spring 1970. He didn't visit the Oakland campus for more than two decades and was struck by the school's changes.

"There was quite a difference between the 1960s, when I attended, and the 1990s when my two daughters visited campus," he said. "Now, they have new recreation facilities, a new library and a new business school."

Gross has reconnected with Oakland thanks to the Summit League games.

"I am reaching the stage of life where I'm reflective," he said. "I'm always grateful for the outstanding professors and the education that I received at Oakland. It was such a unique experience for a kid from South Dakota."

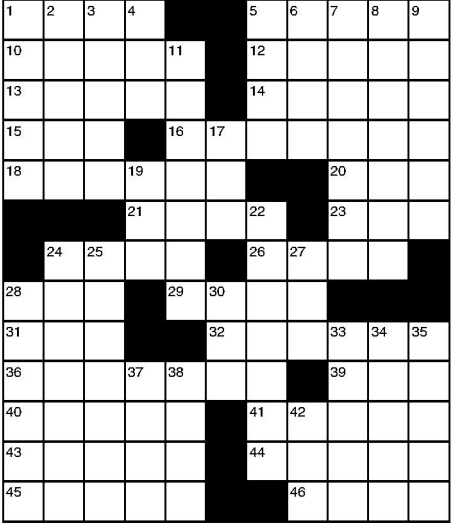
