The depth of the pipelines below the riverbed was reduced by scouring that occurred prior to and during last year's flooding, he said. However, the pipelines were never exposed above ground and their condition was not affected by flood water.  
"We chose to proactively replace the pipeline crossings to assure long-term reliability," Cho said.  
"There are no safety-related concerns with the pipeline crossings."  
The portions of both pipeline crossings done by horizontal directional drilling will be about 3,000 feet long, with the exit and entry points for the bores about 700-750 feet beyond the river banks. To fully

align the eight-inch pipeline with the six-inch pipeline, trenching will be done to install an additional 700 feet of pipe on the north riverbank and 1,000 feet of pipe on the south riverbank.  
"Daily construction activities are scheduled to last for six weeks and will take place during daylight hours unless project needs dictate otherwise," Cho stated.  
He declined to disclose the estimated cost of the project.  
One of the pipelines typically transports different grades of gasoline and diesel fuels. The other pipeline usually carries batches of propane and gasoline.  
The city agreed to offer the additional easement for the project to NuStar for \$29,000 per acre, the same amount asked of TransCanada for its pipeline easement several years ago. The total receipt for the city will be \$77,589.

Thunder Hawk, now secretary of the Rosebud Tribal council is a high school graduate, and has been an office clerk and field assistant at the Rosebud agency.  
• "Early Manufacturing Activities in South Dakota, 1857-1875" is the title of an article written by H. S. Schell, director of the graduate school and professor of American history at the University of South Dakota, and published in the January number of the South Dakota Historical Review. Information contained in the study was generally compiled from early newspapers published in Sioux City and in Dakota Territory.

**Tuesday, March 3, 1987**  
• South Dakota's legal drinking age would be raised to 21 in April next year, under a bill that won final legislative approval Monday in the state Senate. The measure will become law if it's signed by Gov. George Mickelson, who proposed the bill as a way to comply with a federal mandate that withholds a portion of highway aid from states that don't have a drinking age of 21.  
• South Dakota's new license plates have been moving rapidly in Yankton County. The newly designed license plates feature a numerical county identification system that is new to the state this year. The new system has a code to identify the home county of the plates. Plates numbered through nine are organized based on county population, with Minnehaha County No. 1. License plates with numbers 10 and higher are in alphabetical order.
