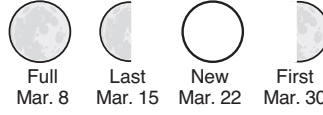

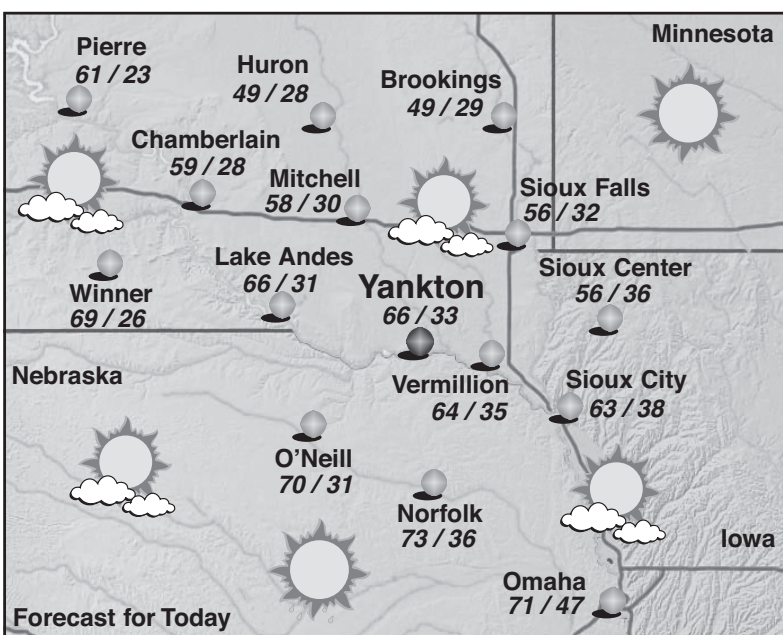

Gayville-Volin School To Hold Preschool Screening

GAYVILLE — Developmental preschool screening for children ages 3 to 5 years old (pre-kindergarten) will be conducted Wednesday, March 21, at the Gayville-Volin Elementary School. Children are invited to participate in a free developmental screening for gross motor skills, fine motor skills, communication, concepts, hearing and health.

Developmental screening gives information about how your child learns skills that are important in predicting success in school. It also helps to identify if your child's skills are appropriate for his/her age or if further testing may be needed. Preschool teachers, speech/language pathologists, school nurses, administrators and support staff will conduct screening with input from other service agencies.

Developmental screening for children age birth to 36 months is also available by special appointment. Make your appointment for screening by contacting the Gayville-Volin School Elementary Principal's office at 267-4476 ext. 108. The screenings are a joint effort of the Gayville-Volin School District, Southeast Area Cooperative and Birth to Three Connections.

That is the decision of the Press and Dakotan, based on an overwhelming affirmative vote in the two-day poll which was concluded yesterday. An extra day was given to permit all possible ballots to be returned and counted. The question presented was: "Shall the Town Gossip Man be Given Another Chance?" The results were: Yes, 287. No, 4.
 Most everyone is wondering when the ice will go out of the Missouri river here. Most everyone is guessing and most anyone's guess is as good as another's. So far there are "no indications." It's just ice with a little water on top. Thick ice, too, 'tis said. At the bridge no one will venture a guess but they do say that it is going to take a considerable flock of such days as today to cause a "break-up".

25 YEARS AGO

Friday, March 6, 1987
 South Dakota will be authorized to spend \$235.1 million in state tax dollars on its operating budget next year, up about \$5 million from the current budget, under a spending bill approved Thursday by the Legislature. Sen. Henry Poppen, R-DeSmet, co-chairman of the Joint Appropriations Committee, said most of the \$5 million increase in spending will go for raising state employee's paychecks and for supporting social programs required by the federal government.
 Defending B champion Hartington Cedar Catholic and C-2 favorite Wausa advanced into today's semifinal round action in the Nebraska Girls' State Basketball Tournament. Meanwhile, Verdigre, also a C-2 club, dropped its first round contest to Lincoln Christian, 73-71.

50 YEARS AGO

Tuesday, March 6, 1962
 Game Warden C. B. Gunderson drove 141 miles Monday checking the condition of pheasants, and says that one or two days of warm weather would do the pheasants more good than any feeding program. Many of the birds he checked, especially in the Lesterville, Menno and Freeman areas, have ice and snow in their feathers, and feed won't help these birds. He found two birds which had been winter-killed, or which froze to death because of the ice and snow under their feathers.
 South Dakota remained under the influence of a ridge of cold Canadian air early today, but temperatures were expected to warm gradually as the ridge moved eastward into the Mississippi valley. The weather bureau said cloudiness would increase tonight and Wednesday.
