# **Grassfire Battled In Knox County**

Firefighters from three towns battled a grassfire that threatened two farms in Knox County Sunday afternoon.

Yankton firefighters were summoned at approximately 3 p.m. with the report of a grassfire, located six miles southeast of Bruno's in South Yankton, Neb. The fire was burning through a combination of pastureland, a cornfield, hillsides and trees.

Firefighters from Wynot, Neb., were also summoned, and a fire crew from Fordyce, Neb., was also called in to contain the blaze, which was burning on both sides of the road and threatening two farms.

Crews were on the scene for about 2 1/2 hours containing the blaze, which was estimated to blacken about 250 to 300 acres.

The fire was believed to have started in a pile of trees, but it was unknown how it started since no controlled burning was going on and the owners of the land were not at home at the time. Sunday's blaze was

several fires reported in the area during the weekend, as warm temperatures, brisk winds and dormant vegetation produced tinderbox conditions.

Rain began falling in Yankton at approximately 7 p.m. Sunday night, temporarily alleviating the dry conditions.

More rain is expected early today (Monday) before giving way to sunshine and more warm weather. Temperatures are forecast to climb into the upper 60s to upper 70s for the rest of the week.

Friday, March 12, 1937 The ice gorge in the Missouri river above Yankton starting around Wedmore Island about six miles upstream and extending several miles further and which had been causing some uneasiness since it started to form early Wednesday morning, went out last evening, releasing a closely packed mass of heavy ice which passed Yankton without incident and went on down stream.

Participation in half a dozen phases of the federal social security and relief programs will cost South Dakota taxpayers nearly \$4,500,000 in the next two fiscal years, if all laws enacted on that subject by the 1937 legislature are put into effect. This does not include the unemployment insurance plan, which is not financed by general taxation, but which will cost employers an estimated \$300,000 to \$400,000 a year.


