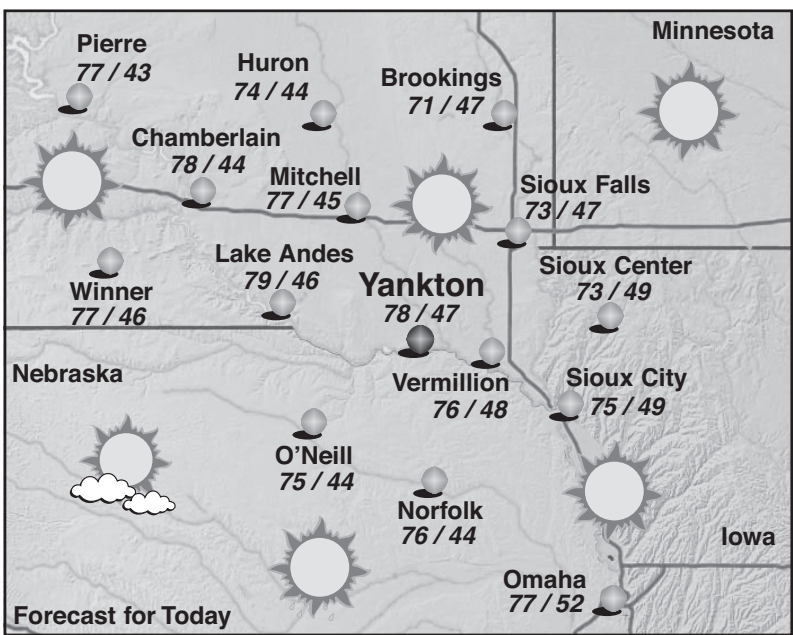

South Dakotans Reminded To Apply For Rural Energy Funding

WASHINGTON — South Dakota farmers, ranchers and businesses are reminded of the availability of federal grants and loan guarantees that help cut their energy costs. The funding, available under the USDA Rural Development Rural Energy for America Program (REAP), can be used for a variety of energy efficiency projects, according to the office of Sen. Tim Johnson. According to USDA Rural Development, REAP funding is often used to install energy-efficient grain drying systems and other projects such as lighting, insulation or purchase of more energy-efficient replacement equipment. Other projects include installing ventilation systems, pumps, coolers, or heating and cooling systems. Some use the funding to generate their own energy through solar panels, wind turbines, biogas or biofuels. Authorized under the 2008 Farm Bill, REAP is designed to assist ranchers, farmers and rural small businesses. All projects must be located in rural areas. USDA Rural Development has supplied the following REAP descriptions and upcoming deadlines:
• Renewable energy system and energy efficiency improvement grant applications and combination grant and guaranteed loan applications: March 30, 2012.
• Renewable energy system and energy efficiency improvement guaranteed loan only applications: on a continuous basis up to June 29, 2012.

BOARD OF TRADE

CHICAGO (AP) — Grains futures mostly rose Monday on the Chicago Board of Trade. Wheat for May delivery rose 8.25 cents to \$6.5125 a bushel; May corn gained 14.5 cents to \$6.595 a bushel; May oats jumped 15.5 cents to \$3.03 a bushel; while May soybeans fell 3.25

cents to \$13.345 a bushel. Beef futures rose while pork futures fell on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange. April live cattle added 0.73 cent to \$1.2875 a pound; April feeder cattle gained half a penny to \$1.5635 a pound; while April lean hogs fell 0.52 cent to 87.30 cents a pound.

ON THIS DATE

75 YEARS AGO
Saturday, March 13, 1937
• The Donaldson store, one of Yankton's largest and oldest pioneer business establishments, located at the corner of Third and Pine streets, was badly damaged by fire early today, an alarm being turned in about 1:30 a.m. The blaze had already gained considerable headway at the rear end of the large structure and it was extinguished only after several hours of fighting by the department. No estimate of the damage was possible this morning, Sanford G. Donaldson, the proprietor said, but it will be considerable, to stock and fixtures as well as to building. All are covered by insurance, and adjusters were on the scene this morning checking up losses with Mr. Donaldson.
• Yankton's high school Bucks dropped their second straight tourney game in the class A state high school basketball game at Mitchell this morning to Aberdeen by a 23-19 score. The Bucks, who lost to Huron yesterday in the championship round, went out to capture an early lead and managed to hold their margin for three quarters of the game. But the Eagles from Aberdeen lashed out with a last period attack that stymied Yankton and pushed them out of further competition.

50 YEARS AGO
Tuesday, March 13, 1962
• City Manager Francis M. Hoag reviewed the costs of street surfacing work, as previously requested by the city commission, at the Monday evening city commission meeting in the city hall courtroom.

What Yankton citizens have been getting for 25 cents per year over a four year period, or \$1.00 total, per assessed front foot, is actually costing the city under pre-set inflated costs about \$1.77 per front foot, Hoag explained.
• Sioux Falls snow, which already was a record for a winter, went past the six-foot mark Monday. Seven inches additional snow over the weekend and Monday brought the 1961-62 fall to 73 inches. The previous record was 66.3 inches in the winter of 1928-1929.

25 YEARS AGO
Friday, March 13, 1987
• More than 1,000 friends and relatives attended a funeral Mass Thursday for former Gov. Richard Francis Kneip, eulogized as a man who loved people. "He loved his family. ... He loved the state and this country. He served it with rare competence, compassion and courage," said Monsignor John McEneaney, who officiated at Christ the King Catholic Church in Sioux Falls.
• Vermillion City Light and Power and the Clay-Union Electrical Corp. are among the South Dakota companies and the state School of Mines and Technology that could be forced to pay thousands of dollars to help clean up a toxic waste site in Missouri. All the companies paid to have PCB-contaminated materials handled by Martha C. Rose Chemicals. Inc. But that company has filed for bankruptcy, and the federal government is taking over disposal of 6 million to 10 million pounds of PCB contaminated liquids and solids.
