

South Dakotans Reminded To Apply For Rural Energy Funding

WASHINGTON — South Dakota farmers, ranchers and businesses are reminded of the availability of federal grants and loan guarantees that help cut their energy costs. The funding, available under the USDA Rural Development Rural Energy for America Program (REAP), can be used for a variety of energy efficiency projects, according to the office of Sen. Tim Johnson.

According to USDA Rural Development, REAP funding is often used to install energy-efficient grain drying systems and other projects such as lighting, insulation or purchase of more energyefficient replacement equipment. Other projects include installing ventilation systems, pumps, coolers, or heating and cooling systems. Some use the funding to generate their own energy through solar panels, wind turbines, biogas or biofuels. Authorized under the 2008 Farm Bill, REAP is designed to assist ranchers, farmers and rural small businesses. All projects must be located in rural areas.


