God Wants Your Faith To Grow

"His divine power has given us everything needed for life and godliness. He has given us, through these things, his precious and very great promises ..." (2 Peter 1:3-4 NRSV

We're in the midst of Lent; but you may have doubts if there's any real growth in your faith. And with all the competing forces in our daily lives, it can be difficult living a life of faith in God with any degree of integrity. Growing in faith, or remaining negligent is, of course, your free will; the choice is yours. And because of the assurance of freedom of religion in this country, we have the option of continuing to run on the treadmill of "self-sufficiency," or of becoming "God-sufficient."

So many things happen in our lives - work, marriage, family, relationships, church, community that we often wonder if we have what it takes to keep going; to "make it" in life. Well, according to the Apostle Peter, God wants to affect every area of our lives, and

when we grow closer to Christ, God's power can become operational in our lives. But, it seems that everywhere we turn, we get this obsession of making it our quest to be self-sufficient in order to achieve the "American way of living.'

Many people think that if a person sets one's mind to it (whatever "it" is), that person

could literally do anything. However, in the process of attempting to do literally anything, of striving to be self-sufficient, the casualty ratio has also been extremely high. The incidents of personal tension, stress at work, family stress, divorce, abusiveness, financial bankruptcy, etc. are all indicators of how we've failed in the face of our human quests.

God doesn't promise us that we'll be granted the magic power to do anything at all on our own. All of Scripture reminds us of that from the very beginning with Adam and Eve. But, by learning to be

"God-sufficient" — trusting in God's power rather than our own we're able to face daily pressures. You may already

know that God is salvation, but to be "God-sufficient" means to practice a prayer life, and to let our faith rest daily in Christ's promises. If you don't make a habit of taking time to

pray, to study and reflect on God's Word, and to worship God, the fruit of your faith will surely remain in an infancy stage.

Think not though, that God is not interested in you, or that God has abandoned you, because you haven't nurtured your faith! God's faithfulness is eternal! God is willing to make himself known to you all the time. God's great desire is to guide and bless our lives, to give us wholeness.

Recent Poll Puts Spotlight On Pastors' Priorities

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KANSAS CITY, Mo. — The Rev. Molly Simpson puts a high priority on hospitality at her

She wants people to feel welcome. That way visitors are more likely to return, she said. "Also, kids are excited to be there, and par-

ents feel comfortable to leave their children with people who can minister to them on their

The proof is in the results.

When the United Methodist Church of the Resurrection's Olathe, Kan., branch started six years ago, attendance was 300 to 350. Now it is 900, Simpson said.

Simpson was considering the recent Barna Group survey of 614 Protestant pastors across the country on how they plan to improve their churches in the next year. The California-based organization that researches spiritual topics gave the pastors a choice of 12 activities and asked them to rate their priorities.

At the top was assessing their church's vision and mission. Fifty-nine percent were definite and 88 percent were definite or probable. At the bottom was finding a search firm to

help hire the right people. Just 2 percent of the pastors said they definitely planned to do this, and only 5 percent were definite or probable.

The second priority was assessing their church's reputation in the community (38 percent were definite and 72 percent definite or probable), followed by measuring the demographic and spiritual needs of their community (31 percent definite and 62 percent definite or

The others in order of importance were: Be more focused on safety and security issues at your church. (25 percent definite) Revamp your budgeting and spending process. (25 percent definite)

Conduct an assessment of spiritual transformation in your church. (22 percent definite) Invest in facilities and equipment for children. (22 percent definite)

Invest in audio and visual equipment. (19 percent definite) Invest in facilities and equipment for teens.

(18 percent definite) Invest in technology and digital media. (18

percent definite)

Work to help increase giving. (6 percent definite)

Ćhurch of the Resurrection's Simpson was surprised that "technology and digital media" were so low, given this will become more important for the church of the future. But it's hard to know whether churches have already made investments in those areas or whether they feel that is too far out of their financial reach.

She was encouraged that "assessing your church's vision and mission" was No. 1.

The rest don't matter if you don't have vision and mission," she said. "We have to change our thinking before we change our behavior. You have to ask why we are doing what we're doing.'

It also surprised her that assessing the church's reputation in the community was No. 2.

"My thought would be that you start with figuring out the needs in the community and try to meet those needs and then your reputation will follow.

David Kinnaman, who directed the study, said: "Most pastors are open to changing their ministries, yet many of them are struggling with the foundational questions of mission and vi-

"In other words, they want a clear direction to pursue, not necessarily just more ministry resources, like facilities, equipment, technology or ministry tools.'

As far as churches' concern with their reputation, Kinnaman said, "In an era of skepticism toward the institutional church, these leaders seem to recognize that the most effective churches are those that are aware of needs and active in their communities."

The study found that the size of the church played a role in the pastors' priorities, but not as much as one might expect. Most of the priorities were of equal importance to small (fewer than 100 adult attendees) and larger churches (more than 250 adults).

The age of the pastor also accounted for some differences in priorities.

ested in technology and digital media, while those between the ages of 45 and 63 were more interested in fundraising help.

A higher percentage of pastors 64 and older were more interested in measuring spiritual formation, the study showed.
