Warmth Continues To Set Marks In Yankton

Yankton saw another unofficial warmth record Friday when the temperature at the airport reached 82 degrees.

That shattered the old mark of 79 degrees last set in 1934.

It was the third time this month the city has set new unofficial high temperature records. The city also set new marks for warm overnight lows on March 10 (45 degrees) and March 11 (43).

The city could see more record heat today (Saturday) with the mercury again expected to reach into the low 80s. The record for St. Patrick's Day is 79 degrees set back in 1901.

Greeneway Won't Attend 'Meet The Candidates'

Yankton School Board president Kathy Greeneway has announced she will not be participating in the "meet the candidates" meeting for school board candidates Thursday, March 22, due to the format of the event.

In a press release, she said candidates at the meeting will be asked approximately 25 questions and are to respond with only "yes" or "no" answers. A voluntary pledge to support the answers given is also requested.

"In my opinion, the answers are not as simple as 'yes' or 'no,'" Greeneway said. "A public official needs to be able to listen to all sides of an issue before they make up their mind. I cannot approach a board term with a pledge on how I intend to vote before particular facts are laid out and the issues studied. Many issues are ever changing, including federal and state funding, mandates, policies, needs, etc. It is only fair that one review each issue with an open mind and is willing to listen to both sides before casting a vote. That is my pledge."

Greeneway added that the voting public has a right to know where candidates stand, and she is willing to answer questions and give her opinions and thoughts on school issues.

"There are many very serious issues before our community and schools," she said. "I will be discussing these issues at public forums on March 29 and April 2."

The school board election is April 10.

Red Cross To Offer Classes

Wednesday, March 17, 1937

- Differences in South Dakota and Iowa statutes governing the regulation of hunting and fishing are believed to preclude any possibility of the game and fish laws of this state being nullified on similar grounds to those which the Iowa supreme court used in wiping out scores of hunting and fishing regulations in that state. The Iowa court yesterday nullified regulations prescribed by the state's conservation commission on the constitutional principle that the legislature cannot delegate legislative power to boards and commissions.
- An interesting letter from Junior Red Cross members of a public school in Dobrzyce, Poland, has just been received by the pupils of the Fairview District No. 16 of Tabor. This is written in acknowledgement of a portfolio which the Fairview Junior Red Cross members sent to Poland last fall. The Junior Red Cross does not sponsor correspondence between individual children. Instead, a collection of material descriptive of schools, customs, climate, local pursuits and other things of interest is assembled and sent to the League of Red Cross societies in Paris where it is translated into the language of the country which the American school chooses.

Some 35 merchandise and promotion exhibits arranged by local business firms were competing for the award, in what most observers describe as the best exposition of its kind ever held here.
