

Warmth Continues To Set Marks In Yankton

Yankton saw another unofficial warmth record Friday when the temperature at the airport reached 82 degrees.

That shattered the old mark of 79 degrees last set in 1934 It was the third time this month the city has set new unofficial high temperature records. The city also set new marks for warm overnight lows on March 10 (45 degrees) and March 11 (43).

The city could see more record heat today (Saturday) with the mercury again expected to reach into the low 80s. The record for St. Patrick's Day is 79 degrees set back in 1901.

In a press release, she said candidates at the meeting will be asked approximately 25 questions and are to respond with only "yes" or "no" answers. A voluntary pledge to support the answers given is also

'In my opinion, the answers are not as simple as 'yes' or 'no,'" Greeneway said. "A public official needs to be able to listen to all sides of an issue before they make up their mind. I cannot approach a board term with a pledge on how I intend to vote before particular facts are laid out and the issues studied. Many issues are ever changing, including federal and state funding, mandates, policies, needs, etc. It is only fair that one review each issue with an open mind and is willing to listen to both sides before casting a vote. That is my pledge.

Greeneway added that the voting public has a right to know where candidates stand, and she is willing to answer questions and give her opinions and thoughts on school issues.

There are many very serious issues before our community and schools," she said. "I will be discussing these issues at public forums on March 29 and April 2.

The school board election is April 10.



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
