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of being an FBI informant. He said the testimony from Troy Lynn Yellow Wood was hearsay. Justice Steven Zinter challenged Murphy on those points, saying that witness testimony that Graham did the shooting was consistent at trial and that the accusation that Aquash was an FBI informant was well established. Jackley said prosecutors at Graham's trial established the motive that AIM members suspected Aquash of being an informant and they embarked on a chain of events that led to her death. He said Looking Cloud's testimony was consistent, and defense attorneys had the chance to cross examine him on the stand. The state Supreme Court will issue a written ruling on the appeal at a later date.

AIM was founded in the late 1960s to protest the U.S. government's treatment of Indians and demand the government honor its treaties with Indian tribes. The group grabbed headlines in 1973 when it took over the village of Wounded Knee, leading to a 71-day standoff with federal agents that included the exchange of gunfire.

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permit. She said someone with evil intent tried to stop her years ago on a highway in her rural area in western South Dakota, but she scared them off by shooting her pistol in the air.

"It saved my life one dark night," Olson said. Olson said South Dakota should join Alaska, Arizona, Vermont and Wyoming, as states that don't require permits to carry concealed handguns.

In his veto message, the governor said he supports people's rights to carry concealed handguns under the current law that requires a permit. He said the vetoed law would have made it difficult for law officers to determine whether people were qualified to carry concealed weapons or were prohibited from doing so because of criminal records or mental health problems.

In addition, the vetoed measure would have caused people who are legally carrying concealed weapons to be detained longer by law enforcement officers as those officers checked whether the gun carriers had been convicted of serious crimes or had mental health problems, he said.

Rep. Lance Russell, R-Hot Springs, said officers could not have detained anyone for long without reasonable suspicion that the person had violated the law by carrying a concealed gun.

Rep., Charlie Hoffman, R-Eureka, said the bill should be defeated to prevent a possible backlash that could lead to tougher gun control. If the bill had passed, and someone had gone to a sporting event and killed a bunch of people, the public might have demanded that the Legislature put more restrictions on guns, he said.
