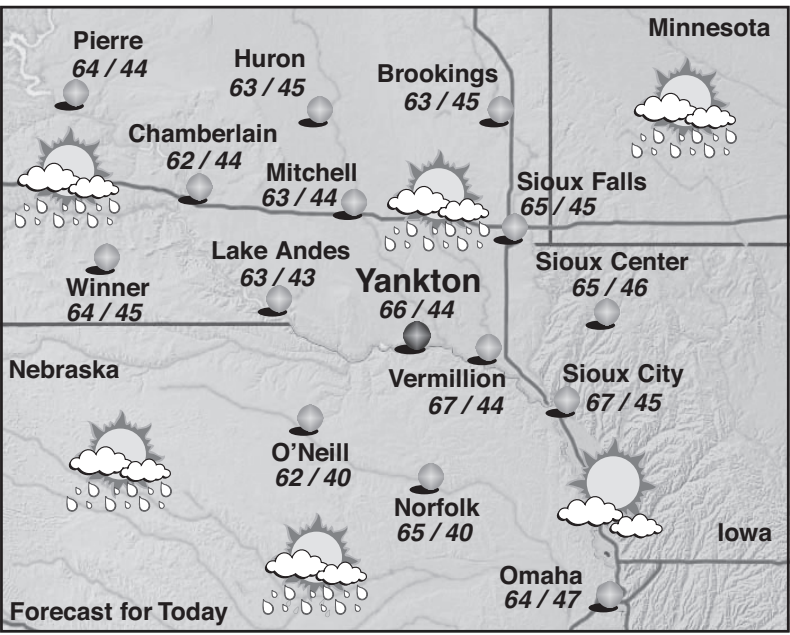

What to Do With Your Tax Refund: A Few Suggestions

LAKE ANDES — Instead of spending your tax refund this year on something that may not last beyond today, Rural Office of Community Services, Inc., of Lake Andes asks you to consider putting it towards something that will help make your financial future grow.

- Reduce Your Debt. Make an extra credit card, car, or house payment to reduce your interest costs.
- Consider buying a U.S. Series I Savings Bond. You can purchase these bonds from most banks, credit unions, or online by visiting: [www.savingsbonds.gov](http://www.savingsbonds.gov).
- Automatic Payroll Deduction. Set up an automatic withdrawal that goes directly to some type of savings account. You can set it up with a bank or mutual fund company, and start the account with your tax refund.
- Emergency Fund. For those who do not already have an emergency fund, now is the time to start one. Ideally, people should have 4-6 months of income put away for an

emergency. However, start small with a \$1,000 in savings. Starting or increasing an emergency fund can reduce stress even if no emergency occurs, or it can be used to prevent a personal crisis if one does occur.

- Invest in Yourself. In this competitive job market it is recommended that people complete courses or certifications that can help boost their current career or provide more options to pursue a new one.
- Open an Individual Retirement Account. For those who do not have any debt, then starting or increasing an IRA account could lead to tax benefits, plus an easier retirement
- Splurge. After being responsible and paying off debt, creating a financial plan, and investing in retirement, individuals should do something such as taking the kids to a movie or buying something nice for a spouse or yourself.

**Monday, March 22, 1937**

- New London, Tex. Whether the titanic force which blasted 455 pupils and teachers to horrible death was gas piped without permission brewed a heated controversy today. In this rich east Texas oil region, now dotted with hundreds of little freshly sodded graves, a military court of inquiry summoned board members of the ill-fated consolidated school, one of whom stammered feebly, “we are not stealing any gas.”
- Making a fine showing for this early in the track season, members of the Yankton college track squad who represented the Greyhounds at the Armour Relays at the University of Chicago fieldhouse Saturday night, returned to Yankton early this morning with three third places in their pockets. The Hound mile relay and sprint medley teams both finished third in the college class.

50 YEARS AGO

**Thursday, March 22, 1962**


- Officials of two states joined here Wednesday afternoon for a conference regarding the Yankton bridge included A. C. Miller, Pierre, South Dakota attorney general; E. L. Schuttler, Norfolk, Neb., captain of Troop B of the Nebraska Highway Patrol; George Koster, Norfolk, Division engineer of the Nebraska Department of Roads and Donald A. Haggard, Pierre, director of Highways of the South Dakota Department of Highways. These men visited briefly just prior to the noon luncheon at the Hotel Charles Gurney which opened the conference dealing with problems of law enforcement on the Yankton bridge and possible changes which might be made in the bridge structure and highway markings leading to it to eliminate some of the accident possibilities.
- “The Golden Promise” is the title of a colorful pageant to be presented by Yankton Girl Scouts this Saturday evening at 7 o'clock at the city hall. It will commemorate the 50th anniversary of Girl Scouting in the USA. A rededication ceremony, the pageant is under the direction of Mrs. Donald Rosenberg, with Mrs. Glen Bachman directing the music. It will climax the local month-long observance of the anniversary, and the Scouts are inviting everyone to attend.
