Tuesday, March 23, 1937

- The South Dakota Welfare commission appealed today to the counties for financial assistance so monthly aid can be given to the state's needy aged during April, May and June. Faced with the prospect of discontinuing monthly payments to eligible persons 65 or more years of age until July 1, when legislative appropriated funds become available, the commission has worked out a plan which, if accepted by the counties, will permit operation of the aid program during the next three months.
- Palmer Ekern, Flandreau, was state checker champion of South Dakota after defeating Sam Morrison, Sioux Falls, defending champion in the final match played in Watertown Saturday night. Ekern won one game out of four, three of the contests being draws. Ekern was state champion in 1932.

50 YEARS AGO

Friday, March 23, 1962

- Appropriations for the Vermillion river flood control project will be taken

up by Corps of Engineers officials in appearances next week before House and Senate committees, according to word Thursday from the office of Sen. Francis Case, R-S. D.

- The Yankton Chamber of Commerce board of directors approved the signing of a contract for a carnival to be sponsored by the sports and recreation committee of the Chamber June 4-9, at the Thursday noon luncheon meeting of the board in the Hotel Charles Gurney. The sports and recreation committee of the Chamber, with Dr. E. I. Shindler as chairman, will use money raised to make the annual contribution to the junior-junior basketball program, help provide trophies at the annual Quarterback Club banquet, and sponsor a golf tournament at the Hillcrest Golf and Country Club.

25 YEARS AGO

Monday, March 23, 1987

- Prizes for the "Just Say No" anti-drug and anti-alcohol poster contest for grades 3-8 were awarded Friday afternoon in the Yankton Community Li-

brary. The contest was sponsored by the Yankton Area Drug and Alcohol Council, in conjunction with Drug and Alcohol Awareness Week. The first place posters will be sent to Nancy Reagan along with a short explanation of how the contest was conducted using her slogan "Just Say No." First place winners were: Amy Bezdichek, 3rd grade Lincoln; Heather Brown, 4th grade Stewart; Allen Sudbeck, 5th grade Sacred Heart; Whitney Buss, 6th grade Beadle; Ben Gall, 7th grade, Middle School; Laura Hillesland, 8th grade Middle School.

- Former Governor Bob Kerrey was the leading choice of 450 Nebraskans who were asked to name the best known living Nebraskan. Kerrey was named by 18 percent of the pole published in the Omaha-World Herald. Other famous Nebraskans were Gov. boards, including the SDSU Economic and Management Task Force, the SDSU Foundation Board, the Mount Marty College Trustees, the National Music Museum, the Center for Western Studies National Advisory Council, the South Dakota Game, Fish and Parks Foundation, the South Dakota Heritage Foundation, the South Dakota Gaming Commission, the South Dakota Investment Council, the Government Relations Council of American Bankers Association and as the president of the South Dakota Bankers Association.

He served in the South Dakota National Guard, retired as a major in the United States Army Reserve and also graduated from the Command and General Staff College at Fort Leavenworth, Kan.

Schramm said one of Ness' most recent contributions that stands out was the substantial financial assistance he and his wife provided toward the

fundraising drive to save the Yankton Middle School activities last year.

Ness said he believes the activities are important, noting that students' home lives have changed over the years.

"These kids now don't have a parent to go home to after school because a lot of them are working, and we cannot be turning these kids loose on the streets when they're in the fifth, sixth, seventh and eighth grade and expect them to be OK," he said. "We need to provide for these students through activities, and what the school provides is a good way to do that."

While Ness has accomplished a lot himself, his attitude has spread to others, Schramm said. "It trickles down to not just the individual himself, but all the people he works with, as well," she said.

Ness said he has made an effort to encourage his employees to be active and involved in the community.

"We all live in this town, and anything we can volunteer our time to, I'm selfish about that," he said. "I want a strong community and one that cares about the people here. Not everyone has

had the opportunities I've had or my employees have had, and our goal is to help out the people that can't do it themselves."

Ness said his bank has done its best to provide support to its employees who wish to give back to the community.

"A lot of the employees that are doing these things are doing them because they have a genuine interest in our community, and with a little moral support from the employer, it goes a long way," he said. "We try to help with that, along with time off and monetary support and any way we can help out."

Ness added that he hopes more people will make efforts to contribute to the community, saying it is the key to the city's future.

"Yankton has a great future ahead of it, but we can't be standing around wringing our hands," he said. "We have to be moving forward. We have to push forward in this town and move on and grow. The community benefits as a whole. There's always somebody that benefits personally, but if the community benefits as a whole, then everybody benefits, and that's pretty important."
