'Dead To You' Won't Let You Go

"Dead to You," by Lisa McMann, Simon Pulse (Simon & Schuster), 2012. 256 pages.



It's every parent's nightmare — your two young sons are playing in the front yard. A car pulls up and the person inside entices one child to get in. The car pulls away and your life becomes a nightmare.

Ethan's life has consisted of three phases that he can remember — his years with Ellen, until she dumped him off in Nebraska when he was fourteen. A year at the group home in Nebraska until he ran away. Another year on the streets in St. Louis until he saw his picture on a website for missing children.

And now he's reunited with his family, feeling both like the 7-year-old he was when he was abducted and like the sixteen-year-old he is now. His family is so much different from what he was used to. With Ellen, there were no rules. He often stayed by himself while she was with the men she "escorted." Living on the street was even less structured, fighting with stray cats for scraps of food.

Even with the rules, it feels good at home. It feels good to have a mom and a dad and to belong. He's not so sure about Gracie, the sixyear-old sister he's never met. He wonders if she realizes that she is a 'replacement' child. She soon wins him over, though, and it's clear she adores him. They form an unspoken



Blake, his 13-year-old brother, is another story. On Ethan's first night home, Blake asks him why he got into the car with the two men — no fighting, no questions, just got right in. After all, Blake was right there and saw it all. Ethan tells Blake that he doesn't know, that

he doesn't remember the abduction. It's obvious Blake is furious with Ethan for all the agony he's caused their family. When Ethan becomes friends, then more, with his old childhood friend, Cami, Blake becomes angrier because he's had a crush on Cami for years.

The transition to school and family life doesn't go smoothly. It's a big adjustment for Ethan and just as big for his family. As Ethan encounters problems at school and with Blake, he hears his parents fighting over how to handle the situation. Blake just blames Ethan — the fights started when Ethan disappeared, things settled down for awhile, and the fights have started up again now that Ethan's home.

Then Blake throws out a truly cruel blow. He tells his parents that Ethan isn't Ethan, but is an imposter. Ethan wonders if it would be best for everyone if he would just leave. But he can't bear the thought of leaving Cami or of breaking Gracie's tender heart or of disappointing Mama who believes so strongly in him. No one has ever believed in him before.

The book is for ages 14 and up, mainly because of the f-word sprinkled throughout and a few sexual comments, which is too bad. Once you get past that, this book will grab hold of you and not let go until you finish it. I had several scenarios in my head of how it might end, but I was totally wrong on every count. The ending blew me away. I dare you to read this book.
