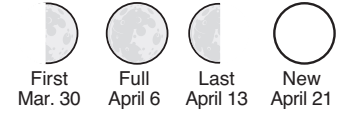

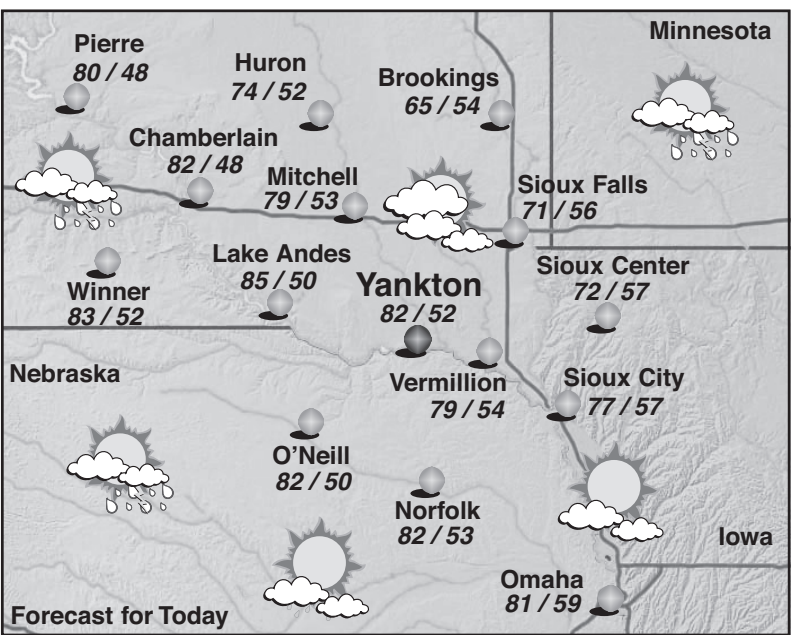

Parish Mission Set For St. Rose Church

CROFTON, Neb. — St. Rose parish is hosting a parish mission featuring Father Matthew Habiger, OSB.

The mission, focused on the Catechism of the Catholic Church, will run each evening at 7 p.m. at St. Rose Church through Wednesday, March 28.

On Monday, March 26, the program will begin with Mass at 6 p.m. and continue with a program on "What the Catholic Church celebrates in the Sacraments."

On Tuesday, March 27, Father Habiger will talk about "What the Catholic Church lives." His talk will cover the Ten Commandments, Theology of the Body according to Pope John Paul II, and Natural Family Planning and its impact on marriage and family life. There will be Reconciliation available at 6 p.m. before

the program begins.

The mission concludes on Wednesday, March 28, with Reconciliation at 6 p.m. followed by a program on "What the Catholic Church prays."

Father Habiger was ordained in 1968 at Benedict's Abbey in Atchison, Kan. After serving a large parish at Burlington, Iowa, he was appointed Newman chaplain at the University of Kansas. He completed his master and doctorate degrees in moral theology at Catholic University of America and began to teach theology at Benedictine College, where he was college chaplain for 10 years.

In 1990, Habiger began a ten-year tour of duty with the pro-life movement, proclaiming the values of the Gospel of Life. During this assignment, he visited cities in the U.S.,

Canada and 55 other countries, organizing conferences, leading speaking tours and leadership training conferences.

The main goal of his lifelong ministry has been to strengthen good marriages and strong family life. Now, he welcomes the opportunity to explain God's plan for human life and love to parishes around the United States.

Those attending the St. Rose mission are asked to bring a copy of the "Catechism of the Catholic Church." If they do not have a copy, several will be available for loan at the church.

on all hard-surface county roads were posted in early March, about a week earlier than 2011.

"We won't do any patching until May, when they get the asphalt plants going," Sorensen said.

"There have been some years where we didn't spend much time patching. I'm hoping this is one of those years."

For the time being, things are looking good, and Sorensen is glad for it.

"A year like this will save on the budget for snow removal, sanding and patching," he stated.

"It gives us a little more money to work on our roads. It helps everything."

**Friday, March 26, 1937**

- It is expected that 2,000 people will attend the district music contest to be held in Vermillion, April 1 and 2. According to H. G. Mosby, member of the state music committee, 1793 students have already sent entries. About 200 supervisors, drivers, and chaperons are expected to bring the total to 2,000 or more. The contest will be staged at five different places on the campus at the same time.
- An eloquent address, in keeping with the devout observance of Holy Week and the significance of Maundy Thursday, was delivered by O. W. Coursey, of Mitchell, at the Masonic Temple last evening. The program followed the obligatory ceremonies by Rose Croix Masons in observance of Maundy Thursday of extinguishing the light. Following this mystic rite the Rose

Croix members only, blue lodge masons, and their wives, DeMolay boys and members of the Eastern Star were guests of the Consistory in a well balanced, skillfully executed and much enjoyed program.

As "National Library Week" approaches, April 8-14, the book shelf custodians were surveyed on how the reading habits of the people have changed in recent years.
- S. R. Bert Newell has written his last folksy letter to more than half-million farmers and others who help gather information for the Agriculture Department's crop reports. Newell will retire March 31 as chairman of the de-

partment's Crop Reporting Board and deputy administrator of the statistical reporting service. Now 65, he had been a federal worker for 40 years, most of the time in the Agriculture Department.
