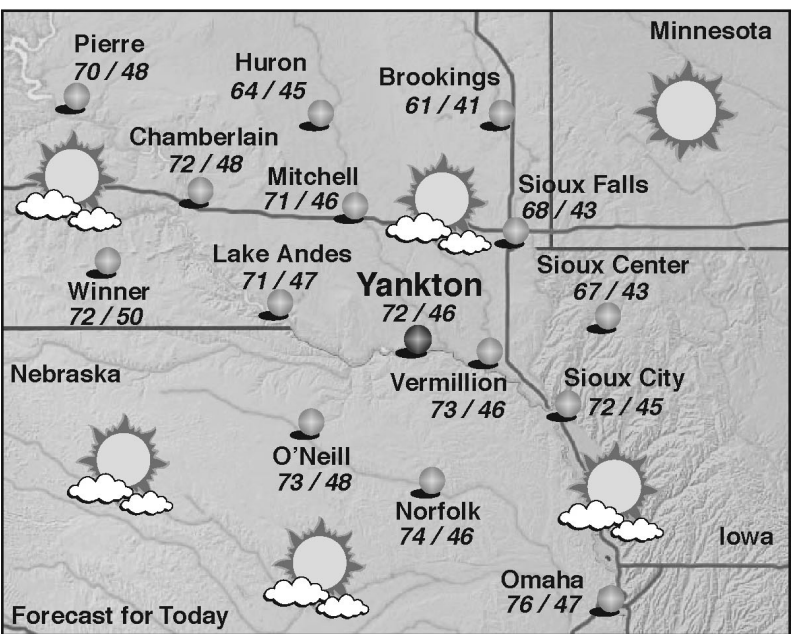

How are South Dakota youngsters faring in 2012? Yankton area residents are invited to learn firsthand at a briefing at noon-1 p.m. on Tuesday, April 3, on the status of South Dakota children. Hosted by United Way & Volunteer Services of Greater Yankton, it will be held at the Technical Education Center, 1200 W. 21st St. Scheduled speakers include:

• Property tax in Yankton increased 9 percent this year, according to an annual report prepared by the South Dakota Municipal League. The figures show that a Yankton house valued at \$50,000 would have a \$1,124 tax bill in 1986, payable in 1987. That compares to \$1,040 tax on the same property in 1985.  
• Since a 1968 airplane crash that took the lives of six Rapid City cheerleaders, there has been a special award presented at the boys and girls state basketball tournaments. The honor, which was started in 1970, is bestowed to the cheerleading squad, chosen by a secret panel of judges from the eight schools who qualified for the tourney. It is called the "Spirit of Six" award. The award is presented by the South Dakota Peace Officers' Association and is given for the squad which is considered best on crowd control, dress, sportsmanship and enthusiasm. At last weekend's Class B state boys basketball tournament, a quartet of Irene cheerleaders were named the recipient of the 1987 honor.

CHICAGO (AP) — Grains futures mostly fell Tuesday on the Chicago Board of Trade. Wheat for May delivery fell 19.75 cents to \$6.3975 a bushel; May corn fell 7 cents to \$6.3075 a bushel; May oats rose 7.25 cents to \$3.40 a bushel; while May soybeans fell 9.75 cents to \$13.6975 a bushel. Beef futures and pork futures rose on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange. from the state at a cost of approximately \$1.95 million. Do you think this is an option that should be pursued? Why?

Yes, we should pursue it and we are. Having the opportunity to purchase it and a mechanism in place to pay for it makes it an easy decision. This will help the city and others to direct the best long-term use for that area. The whole north part of Yankton is going to go through some great changes in the years to come that will help the whole community. The city will need to do more of a study once the area gets going to determine the best options for the City of Yankton.

**3. The Meridian Bridge opened for pedestrian use in November and has become a popular recreation spot. Plans are to put in green space and some landscaping on the north side this spring. Do you think the city should do more to develop the bridge and surrounding area in the future? If so, what?**

Yes, the city should develop the area more. I believe we have a great opportunity with the bridge being done and a great historic area downtown. There are different groups the city can get assistance from to help with the process to develop the look of the area and the activities that can be added. This first full year being open will help give ideas on traffic flow, the activities people will want to see added and how this can all be tied into the existing trails and downtown area.

**4. When it comes to working on economic growth, do you believe there are opportunities that the City Commission and its economic development allies have not fully explored? Do you have ideas on how the city could improve its economic development approach?**

There are always areas that have not been explored, or some areas that may need to be touched on again. There are great people in place working for economic development in Yankton. The city needs to make sure we keep moving forward and giving the different groups the tools they need to keep promoting Yankton. We need to make sure we are getting these people in front of as many different groups we can, whether it be at trade shows or visiting different companies to promote Yankton. We also need to keep in mind how to partner with existing companies in Yankton in assisting them to grow.

**5. The Joint Vermillion/Yankton Solid Waste System is completing its long-term masterplan, and that includes consideration of the recycling program. Do you believe it is important to expand recycling services for this area, and if so, is it important enough to contemplate raising the cost of service?**

The recycling program is costing Yankton/Vermillion to run it. I don't think we need to make a change now, but we do need to keep our eye on cost of service and the sale of the products. Recycling is the right thing to do for our future generations and will continue to grow. We do need to try and educate people to recycle more and start our children on the right road, also. The Joint Powers is beneficial to both communities, even though we do things differently. It is a partnership that is working, but we do need to keep studying it to make sure we have enough planned for the future. I would not want to see us add an additional amount to the utility bill just for recycling at this time.

**6. Any closing thoughts?**

I have enjoyed being a City Commissioner for the past few years and appreciate the opportunity I have had in meeting different people and working with them. Yankton is fortunate to have people willing to put their time into the different groups we have to make it a great community. Thank you for your support.
