Incorporation papers have been filed for the Union County Rural Power company of Elk Point capitalized at \$6,000, and organized to transmit electricity over about 400 miles of line. The papers said the company would distribute electric power from Elk Point to farms in Jefferson, Civil Bend, Elk Point, Richland, Brule, Sioux Valley, Spink, Emmet, Prairie, Big Springs Al-

cester and Virginia townships. Incorporators are James J. Gill, A. A. Pace, Earl R. Pike, Victor Olson and George Donnelly, all of Elk Point.

The inspection is expected to last approximately one week and will include Saturday and Sunday. During this time, boating and fishing will be prohibited in the spillway area, and the area known as the "Fishing Wall" will

be closed to fishing. Individuals fishing will also be prohibited from casting in the direction of the spillway.

"While the divers are in the water, we really don't want any boats in there or fishing going on there. That's really not a good mix," Becker said. "It just gives the divers a good, safe environment that way."

Teens Sought for Youth Training Academy

PIERRE — The South Dakota Highway Patrol and the American Legion of South Dakota are sponsoring a Youth Trooper Academy in Pierre at the South Dakota Law Enforcement Training Center on June 25-29.

The academy is open to 16- and 17-year-old male and female students entering their senior year of high school. Each candidate must be in good academic standing with their school and possess a valid South Dakota driver license. The program is open to all senior students, regardless of race, color, gender, religion, or national origin.

"This program is an intensive, one-week learning experience that will be mentally and physically demanding," said Col. Craig Price, superintendent of the Highway Patrol. "Candidates should be highly motivated, of good moral and ethical character, and have an interest in a career in law enforcement."

Price also wants potential candidates to know that the Youth Trooper Academy utilizes a paramilitary approach to training, and discipline is strict.

The application deadline is April 20, with space limited to 16 students from across South Dakota.

Successful candidates are sponsored by their local American Legion Post to attend the academy free of charge.
