Deputy Ag Secretary Meets With Tribal Leaders

LOWER BRULE (AP) — Deputy Agriculture Secretary Kathleen Merrigan says the U.S. Department of Agriculture needs to do more to try to help end the poverty for Native American people in South Dakota. Merrigan made the comment Thursday after meeting with tribal

leaders on the Lower Brule Indian Reservation in South Dakota.

She says the agency and tribal leaders need to focus on bringing more jobs to reservations in the state and providing nutritious foods. Merrigan also toured the Lakota Foods facility. It's the first and only

Native American business that produces, processes, packages and

She says she was impressed with the facility and its focus on valueadded food processing.

USDA: Corn Prices Inch Up In South Dakota

SIOUX FALLS (AP) — The U.S. Agriculture Department says corn prices in South Dakota inched up in February.

The South Dakota office of the National Agriculture Statistics Service says corn, at \$6.87 per bushel, is up 2 cents from last month and up 81 cents from last year.

The preliminary winter wheat price, at \$7.66, is down 44 cents from last month but up 97 cents from last February. The spring wheat price, at \$7.81, is 28 cents lower than last month and 40 cents lower than last year.

Soybeans are unchanged from last month at \$13.90, up \$1.90

The Ag Department says the preliminary all sunflower price, at \$22.60, is down \$2 from last month but down \$4 from last year.

Judge Rejects Challenge To Execution Method

PIERRE (AP) — Attorney General Marty Jackley says a state court judge has rejected a death row inmate's challenge to South Dakota's single-drug execution method.

Charles Rhines is sentenced to die for the 1992 fatal stabbing of 22year-old Donnivan Schaeffer during the burglary of a doughnut shop in Rapid City. He argued that the state's one-drug protocol violates constitutional prohibitions against cruel and unusual punishment.

Jackley says South Dakota's protocol is modeled after one approved by the U.S. Supreme Court. He says 7th Circuit Court Judge Thomas Trimble ruled that South Dakota's method does not pose a risk of unconstitutional pain and suffering. Rhines can appeal.

The method is a single dose of pentobarbital. It was used in the execution of two death row inmates in South Dakota last fall.

Lost 3-Year-Old Boy Was Protected By Pet Dog

CUSTER (AP) — A 3-year-old boy who wandered away from his western South Dakota home and became lost in the woods was protected by his dog, authorities say.

The boy was missing for about an hour Monday before police found him unharmed about a quarter mile from his Custer home, Custer County Sheriff Rick Wheeler told the *Rapid City Journal*. The protective pit bull would not let rescuers near the boy, until the boy's father was able to take the dog home.

"He was showing me that this was not my area," Wheeler said of the dog. "I know that look."

Authorities tracked the boy and his dog by following footprints

"We took off on a dead run until we found him," Wheeler said

more than a dozen searchers, including the boy's parents. Wheeler said it was not clear if the dog was following the boy or

"I think it was a joint venture," the sheriff said with a chuckle. The boy had no obvious injuries but was taken to a hospital as a precaution.

S.D. Faces Federal Cuts, Furloughs

PIERRE — South Dakota could lose at least

\$10 million in federal funding from automatic spending cuts set to take effect Friday, but Gov. Dennis Daugaard said he is most worried about what will happen in programs that educate struggling students and help low-income people heat their homes and put food on the table.

Daugaard said state officials Wednesday were still trying to understand exactly what would be cut from federal funds handled by the state and how those cuts would be applied. He said he was asking state agencies to provide more details on the cuts.

"I don't know that it'll be a dramatic impact. We're trying to understand that right now. We're trying to evaluate that right now," Daugaard said.

If President Barack Obama and Republican congressional leaders don't reach agreement on another way to reduce the federal debt by Friday, \$85 billion in automatic, across-theboard cuts will take effect.

The Republican governor said he's upset that the president has insisted that the federal spending cuts be applied across the board, rather than letting federal agencies focus the cuts in programs that have little impact on people's daily lives.

For example, some of the cuts will hit grant programs that help cities build water lines and other projects. Those cities will not be forced to lay off anyone, but will only have to scale back pipelines, Daugaard said.

"That's an easier area to cut than, say, somebody who's counting on it to pay their heating bills or pay their food bills," Daugaard said. Daugaard said school dis-

tricts will lose money for special education and programs that help struggling students, such as one that provides teachers to help students who have trouble reading. Cuts also are slated for a program that helps low-income

people pay winter heating bills and the nutrition program for low-income women with small children.

Daugaard

Jason Dilges, the governor's budget director, said the cuts could bring furloughs for state employees paid with federal money. The governor and the Legislature could decide to use state money to replace lost federal funds, he said.

"We'll have to look at the citizens of South Dakota and their well-being because these are going to affect us relatively quickly, Dilges

The timing of the federal cuts also complicates the process of approving a state budget for the year that begins July 1. The Legislature plans to pass that budget by the end of next week, the end of the main run of South Dakota's legislative session.

Dilges said he plans to propose only minor changes in the \$4.1 billion state budget Daugaard proposed in early December, but the federal spending cuts could affect state revenue and spending. If prolonged spending cuts hurt the economy, state tax collections could suffer, he said.

Wade Pogany, director of the Associated School Boards of South Dakota, said school

tween \$2 million and \$3.5 million in federal funding for special education and programs that help disadvantaged students. As the Legislature prepares to pass a state budget. schools are asking that lawmakers provide extra money to help schools recover from state budget cuts made two years ago, he

"It couldn't come at a worse time for schools, given their financial situation right now," Pogany said of the federal cuts.

The South Dakota National Guard also has said the federal budget cuts would likely force it to furlough 548 full-time personnel for 22 days over the next five months. More than half the National Guard's 918 full-time employees would lose one day's work and pay each week for 22 weeks starting in late April. They would lose more than \$4.2 million in wages, officials said.

Daugaard said a group that all states use to analyze federal spending has estimated South Dakota will lose \$14 million in federal spending from March through September, but the state budget office estimates the loss at only \$10 million. The state expects to lose nearly \$5.7 million in federal money from March through June 30, the end of the state's budget year, and another \$4.3 million from July through September, the end of the federal budget year, he said.

The governor said he expects the cuts to take place Friday, but the president and Congress might be forced to make a budget deal later to replace the automatic cuts. For example, if a budget resolution doesn't pass Congress by April 15, members of Congress won't get paid, he said.

Board Delivers Good Budget News For Neb. Lawmakers

LINCOLN, Neb. — Nebraska lawmakers received some good budget news Thursday, as the state's forecasting board predicted a boost in tax revenues that will create an estimated \$81 million surplus.

The Nebraska Economic Forecasting Advisory Board approved new projections that, if accurate, would increase state tax collections \$64.9 million more than previously expected. The Legislature's budget-writing Appropriations Committee released

week that would create a \$16 million surplus.

Lawmakers began the session with an estimated \$195 million revenue shortfall, which assumed that nothing in state law would change to affect the

The budget remains fluid, but the additional revenue for the current fiscal year and the next two gives lawmakers more flexibility as they pick spending priorities. On average, the board predicted that revenues will come in 4.4 percent higher than previously expected.

'Today's estimates are a reassurance that we're within reach

of a reasonable and sustainable budget for the next few years,' said Sen. Heath Mello of Omaha, chairman of the budget-writing Appropriations Committee.

Lawmakers and the governor rely on the board's projections when setting the state's two-year budget. The board is made up of members with economic backgrounds from across the state, including five members appointed by the Legislature and four named by the governor. The group bases its projections on predictions compiled by the executive branch's Department of Revenue and the Legislature's fiscal office.

The revenue forecasting board is a nine-member panel whose members represent all parts of the state. Board members credited strong construction activity and farming as key drivers of the economy, while raising concerns about the drought and weakened consumer spending. Members said the housing market remains strong, particularly in Omaha and Lincoln.

"It may be our conservative values that make us a little different from other parts of the country," said board member Tonn Ostergard, of Lincoln.




