The Pheasants faced the Centerville Tornadoes in Harrisburg, claiming a 55-53 victory to earn them the title.

"The one thing these girls don't know is the word 'quit," Parker head coach Tami Jurgens said. "They are hard-nosed, hard-playing kids. They are very determined, very stubborn girls, and it works for them.'
