"We have about 60 Sudanese in Yankton, most of them Lost Boys," Maguet said. "Many people are surprised to learn that (figure). It's word of mouth that we're here (in Yankton)."

The Lost Boys attract attention in public, which they welcome as a learning opportunity for area residents.

We really want people to understand us," Maguet said. "Around Yankton, they come up to us (in a store) and talk to us. They ask, 'Aren't you the Lost Boys?'

Ajak has also drawn curious bystanders. "People ask me a lot of questions (about the Lost Boys), and I tell them the details," he said.

The Lost Boys have run into a number of misconceptions.

"So many people think we were born here (in America), that we're from one of the Southern states," Ajak said. "They also don't realize that 99 percent of us are Christian, like the people here in Yankton. Back home, we have different religions, but 90 percent (of the South Sudanese) are the Christian religion."

Ajak serves as vice-chairman of the local Lost Boys organization, while Maguet serves as vice-chairman of the entire Sudanese community. The object of those groups isn't to insulate immigrants from the larger community. Rather, it's to provide support and resources such as transportation or translators, the two men said.

### **ARRIVING IN A NEW LAND**

The Lost Boys started immigrating from their war-torn African homeland more than a decade ago. Ajak and Maguet joined other Lost Boys relocated to Sioux Falls. About 600 Lost Boys currently reside there, the two men said.

But the Lost Boys and other Sudanese immigrants found the Sioux Falls jobs dried up in the midst of the recession, and they set their sights on Yankton where they found employment. The two men said most, if not all, Lost Boys in Yankton work at one of two large plants in the community.

They see challenges in assimilating among Yankton's 14,000 residents.

"Language is an issue for many people, especially for those who didn't go to college. It's a large problem," Ajak said. "Most are trying (to improve their English). Some attend GED classes, others are in English as a Second Language (ESL) courses. Some are working on their masters degree.'

Maguet acknowledges some local residents even find difficulty understanding South Sudanese who speak fluent English.

"Some people have problems with our accents," he said. "But we work at it, and they find that we can get along.' Finding affordable housing can also

prove challenging, Maguet said. "Most apartments are for low-income people, and you often don't qualify if you work full-time," he said. "Housing is a major challenge, but it gets easier the longer you live here."

# A LIFETIME ON THE RUN

For the Lost Boys, adjusting to a new land has been a way of life. Their move from Sioux Falls to Yankton, while challenging, has been nothing compared to their constant lifetime escape from death.

The Lost Boys were caught in the civil war that consumed their homeland and eventually led to South Sudan's independence. The northern part of Sudan is mostly desert and populated by Arab Muslims. The southern part, where the Lost Boys lived, contains the nation's resources and is populated by black Africans who are Christians.

The Lost Boys feared they would be killed or captured and forced to fight for the Sudanese government forces against their own people. The Lost Boys fled to Ethiopia, remaining in that country before an overthrow of the Ethiopian government forced the boys to flee back to Sudan.

"By crossing the border at the Gilo River (between Ethiopia and Sudan), we had a number of Lost Boys who died because they couldn't swim,' Maguet said. "Many of the Lost Boys were washed away because of the high speed of the river, and they never found the bodies."

The Lost Boys faced another danger from crocodiles in the river, Ajak said.

Those who survived the ordeal eventually relocated to refugee camps in Kenya before settling in the United

"Most of (the Lost Boys) came to the United States between 2001 and 2005, but some came in 2006," Maguet said. "They started school, and many of them received college and technical education while working."

Both Ajak and Maguet graduated from South Dakota State University (SDSU) in Brookings. Maguet graduated in December 2007 with a business degree and went on to earn his Master of Business Administration (MBA) degree at Colorado Technical University. Ajak graduated from SDSU in May 2008, majoring in construction technology, and plans to pursue more education.

"It was a huge adjustment," Maguet said about learning the United States' educational system.

Ajak didn't come directly to Sioux Falls upon arriving in the United States

"I originally went to Las Vegas. I was there for two months," he said. "If you came from Africa, and (Las Vegas) was where you lived, you thought this was what all of America was like.'

Just a short time later, the worst terrorist attack on U.S. soil affected Ajak's life hundreds of miles away on the other side of the country.

"It was shortly after 9/11, and there were no jobs (because of the collapsed tourism industry)," he said. "I had cousins who were working in Sioux Falls, so I left (Las Vegas) to see if I could find a job in South Dakota. I realized there was more to America, a part that wasn't urban, that there were many rural areas."

The Sudanese immigrants found they adapted better to the 9/11 attacks than their American friends, Ajak said.

"When 9/11 hit, we were used to a lot of war (in Africa)," he said. "But it was a surprise to see that America was attacked. People didn't know what to Despite the upheaval in his life, Ajak

found he enjoyed the quiet of his new

Midwest home. "Sioux Falls is a very small town compared to Las Vegas, but it was the right place for me," he said. "During a time, I visited Dallas and Chicago. I realized that I didn't want the big city, that I wanted just the small town.

## **BUILDING A NEW FUTURE**

Both Ajak and Maguet have wives and children living in South Sudan, and they plan to bring their families to the United States when they can afford it. With families still in their homeland, the two men felt strong emotions about the 2011 election on South Sudan independence. Sudanese citizens were allowed to vote at elections sites in various parts of the United States.

Ajak cast his vote for independence at an Omaha election site.

'It was a good experience. The fight for independence (in the Sudanese civil war) led us to be Lost Boys, and it was taking a very long time (to win freedom)," he said. "We were happy to participate (in the election) and to become a new nation."

In the end, the suffering caused by the Sudan civil war led to independence for the southern region, Maguet said. "You appreciate the work that my people have done," he said.

While proud of South Sudan, both Ajak and Maguet have become American citizens. They consider it a major turning point in their lives.

"America is a great nation, and it's good to be part of the United States,"

Maguet agreed, speaking with emotion about becoming an American citizen. "It means a lot to me," he said. "The

U.S. is a good country. It's hard to de-

scribe what it's like to be an American."

Ajak expects the Lost Boys and Sudanese population will continue to grow in Yankton. "More are coming, one by one," he

predicted. After traveling halfway around the world, the Lost Boys are no longer lost, Maguet said. They have found their home.

"At first, we were guests, strangers with a different history," he said. "Now, we are a part of the community."
