- districts such as Huron, Sioux Falls and Rapid City, Stevens said. "In Sioux Falls, they have a classroom where not any two students speak the same language," he said.
- However, those special funds draw down the base amount available for K-12 state aid, Stevens said. "Among our freshman legislators, we see the desire to do more for K-12, so we will see how things fall out," he said.
- MEDICAID EXPANSION
- Jean Hunhoff doesn't see support among Senate Republicans for expanding Medicaid as allowed under federal health reform. Many legislators believe the state should wait, particularly with uncertain federal funding, she said.
- "We can look at other options this year, but a full blown-out Medicaid expansion — I don't think we will see it this year," she said.
- Stevens said he had expected more definitive information by now. He also expressed concern about federal funding and changes in the rules once states committed to the expansion.
- "My concern with the budget is that you don't get into the situation we were in a couple of years ago, where we had to cut 10 percent," he said.
- Democrats have made Medicaid expansion a priority in the session, and Bernie Hunhoff said the state must act now. The federal government will initially cover 100 percent of expansion costs, and the state has the funds to cover \$1.5 million in administrative costs the first year, he said.
- "We have until 2020 (to expand Medicaid), which is fine if everyone was insured," he said. "But if you're one of the 48,000 (South Dakotans) who live in poverty, who are holding two or three jobs, you don't have that much time."
- About 180,000 South Dakotans — nearly half the workforce — hold full-time jobs paying \$11.46 an hour or less, he said. "There is no way you can make \$11.46 or less and afford insurance. Try it," he said.
- Hunhoff challenged the GOP governor and legislative majority
- to expand Medicaid.
- "There's more to leadership than balancing the checkbook. It's a moral issue at this point," he said. "My Republican colleagues may agree that we can wait until 2020, but the people of South Dakota are really suffering. "At some point, we need to raise hell about it."
- SENTINEL BILL
- The sentinel bill, which allows school staff or other personnel to carry firearms, has been amended in the Senate to make a school board's decision referable to a public vote, Jean Hunhoff said. The measure now goes back to the House for further consideration.
- Stevens said he voted for the bill, believing it's a matter of local control.
- "Where in Yankton do we get to say how (others) run their school district? We wouldn't want them making decisions for us," he said. "How many times have we said that we're tired of Washington telling us what to do? I was on the school board, and we were tired of Pierre telling us what to do."
- Bernie Hunhoff said he opposes the bill.
- "I am still waiting to hear from the first teacher or administrator that thinks this is a good idea," he said. "It puts schools in a really bad position. If any school personnel is with a gun, and it gets misused by school staff, where is the liability going to be, especially in this litigious society?"
- In other issues during Saturday's crackerbarrel:
- In voting against a texting ban, Stevens said the only survey presented to the House Judiciary Committee showed that texting bans are ineffective and don't re-
- sult in major impacts.
- The bill's sponsor wouldn't accept an amendment making the texting a secondary offense, Stevens said. As a primary offense, police could stop a vehicle for allegedly texting, then conduct a search, he said. The issue also raises the question of liability and grounds for a lawsuit, he added.
- Jean Hunhoff said she voted for the texting ban in the Senate, while Bernie Hunhoff said he would vote for a texting ban if it reaches the House floor.
- The District 18 delegation said they supported pre-natal care for the children of mothers currently not covered because of their citizenship status. They noted the amount invested in pre-natal care would immediately save \$3 for every \$1 spent. Over the course of a child's lifetime, the savings would grow to \$13 for every \$1 spent on pre-natal care.

- 75 YEARS AGO

Friday, March 4, 1938

A belated roar from the March lion sent a mixture of sleet and snow swirling over South Dakota last night and today with the snowfall ranging up to three inches in the northern and eastern parts of the state.

Seventy new cases of whooping cough were reported to the state health department during the week ended March 1. Of the total, 52 cases were reported from Lyman county. There were 63 new cases of chickenpox with 17 of the total in Davison county.

50 YEARS AGO

Monday, March 4, 1963

Yankton police were holding for questioning and further investigation a man who was found hiding at Rhan Motors company, Second and Douglas, Sunday night. The man has admitted being an escapee from prison in California.
- The delegation noted that South Dakota already has one of the highest mortality rates in the nation.
- Stevens said the bill amounts to covering 184 children who become American citizens upon taking their first breath. The proposed spending under the bill would be easily matched by just two or three children with problems that could have been prevented, he said.
- Unfortunately, the issue has become wrapped up as a debate on immigration reform, Stevens added.
- The District 18 delegation said they supported excluding holidays and weekends from a 72-hour waiting period for abortions. They noted many counseling services aren't open during those times, and state law mandates that women seeking abortions must go to a pregnancy center.
