Top-Ranked Sutton Rallies Past Crofton In Class C2 Action

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LINCOLN, Neb. — Crofton fans had waited 85 years to make a trip to the Nebraska State Boys' Basketball Tournament.

Austin Rath made sure that the Warrior faithful would have to wait a little while longer for their first state tournament victory since

Rath scored 22 points, two above his teamleading 20.2 points per game, including seven points in a key third quarter when Sutton took control on the way to a 37-24 victory over the Warriors in the opening round of the Class C2 Tournament on Thursday at Lincoln High.

Sutton held the Warriors without a field goal for a stretch of just over 10 minutes, as the Mustangs went from down 14-10 to up 18-15. The Warriors used a five-point possession — an off-the-ball foul on a three-point attempt and a basket on the in-bounds — to take an early 9-5 lead, and held the upper hand until Rath's steal and layup at the end of the first half gave the Mustangs a 16-15 halftime lead.

The Warriors held the upper hand early thanks to preparation, according to head coach

We scouted them hard," he said. "We like to play man, but we knew their quickness would make it tough for us to stick with them. We'd seen some teams have success against them with a zone, so we had to figure out what type of zone we could best play against them."

Crofton's aggressiveness offensively was also paying dividends, said senior Justin

Kaiser Leads Cedar Catholic To C2 Win

LINCOLN, Neb. — For three of the four quarters of basketball Hartington Cedar Catholic and North Platte St. Patrick's played in the first round conclave of the Class C2 State Basketball Tournament on Thursday, the teams each scored 40 points.

But it was Cedar's ability to outscore their foes in the second quarter, and right a minor stumble that sustained them in their 56-49 victory.

Twenty-one points from James Kaiser certainly didn't hurt the Trojans, either.

As one would expect in a matchup of No. 4 and 5 seeds, the two teams were evenly matched, and the first quarter indicated the fans at Lincoln High were in for an exciting, close game. After St. Patrick's scored the game's first bucket, the Cedar boys answered with 8 unanswered points, including a steal and layup by Logan Feilmeier midway through the opening frame.

But St. Pat's fashioned its own little run, 8-0 over the next three minutes, grabbing a 10-8 lead at the 51-second mark of the first stanza. A perfectly-executed inbounds play that enabled Taylor Kathol to slip in for a layup tied the game at 10-10 with 35 sec-

onds on the first period clock. St. Patrick's broke that tie with the first 4 points of the second stanza, for a 14-10 lead, but the Trojans went on a tear, sparked by Kaiser's 3-point shot at the 6:45 mark, and launched a 13-2. When Kaiser stole the ball at midcourt and dropped in the layup, at the 1:40 mark of the second half, Cedar held a 23-16 lead.

St. Pat's tallied the final 3 points of the half, but the Trojans were in front, 26-19 at the midway First Round, March 7 Lincoln, Neb.

One of the keys to the lead was Cedar's defense, which refused to allow the ball to get inside, especially to Joe Clinch, who came in to the tourney averaging 15.3 points per game. Cedar head coach Matt Steffen said the Cedar practices in the days leading up to the tourney were all about denying the ball to St. Pat's dangerous inside players. Clinch was limited to 3 first half points.

"We execute our offense the best when we execute as a team," Steffen noted of his 21-7 Trojans. "We did that quite well in the second quarter, and that, plus defense, gave us the lead.

But just as a leaky dam eventually breaks, Clinch found the bucket in the third period. The 6'2" St. Pat's senior scored 10 of the Irish's 14 third period points, including hitting their first four buckets of the second half.

But Cedar answered every basket Clinch and his mates made. Using a balanced scoring attack that saw five players find the scorebook, the Trojans let the Irish edge no closer than five, and at four times during that frame, nudged their lead to seven. And that was the margin when the third eriod buzzer sounded, 40-33.

Wynot jumped out to a 15-6 lead after one quarter and held the Hornets at bay the rest of the way in a 55-40 decision in the Class D2 opening round at the Nebraska State Boys' Basketball Tourna-

Nathan Wieseler and Davis Wieseler each scored 14 points for Wynot (23-3), which will play Falls City Sacred Heart today (Friday) at 3:45 p.m. at Pershing Auditorium. Jackson Sudbeck added 10 points in the win.

Wilson Provides Spark For USD Women; Coyotes Open Tournament Action Sunday

VERMILLION — When Tempestt Wilson steps onto the court at the Sioux Falls Arena on Sunday afternoon to open Summit League play, the USD senior will be making her 77th consecutive start for the Coyotes — 36 more than second on the current roster (fellow senior Alexis Yackley with 41).

Wilson, who will have started 90 of her 92 career games for the Coyotes after transferring to Vermillion for the 2010-11 season from Iowa Western Community College, was named to the All-Summit League Second Team on Thursday.

After losing 60 percent of the team's offensive production from a year ago to graduation, Wilson met with new head coach Amy Williams before the season started and said that her number one goal for her final year on the court was to be more consistent.

"She didn't want to have a great game here or there," Williams said. "She has really sparked us offen-

In addition to her offensive exploits — Wilson finished second on the team in scoring with 12.9 points per game and led the squad in three pointers and free throws – Wilson was also a menace to opposition guards.

"I can hardly explain what she's meant to our team offensively and defensively — just carrying us,

"It took me awhile, but my confidence and my game is where it should be."

Williams added. "That scoring punch that she brings and being able to defend the opposing team's best players are huge for our

The soft-spoken Wilson admits that it took some adjusting to not being the "featured" player on the team's roster at first, but eventually she grew into that role.

When I first started playing basketball I felt like I was always that leader and always taking over in the last minute of the game," Wilson said. "The transition (not alwavs being that go-to player) was hard at first. It took me awhile, but my confidence and my game is where it should be.'

Wilson has steadily raised her scoring average from 8.4 points per game during her 2010-11 campaign to nearly 13 points per game this season while also grabbing more rebounds and committing fewer turnovers. She finished the year posting double-digit points in 17 of the final 19 regular season games scoring a career-high 26 points at

IUPUI on January 26. Making the NCAA tournament in USD's first year of eligibility is the ultimate goal this year according to Wilson. The journalism/mass communication major said that regardless of how this season ends, she still sees herself being heavily involved in the game she loves.

'I really do want to keep playing if I can," Wilson said. "I'd love to play overseas and eventually pursue coaching."

Wilson's current coach summarized what Tempestt has meant to a fledgling Coyotes squad this season outside of the box score in two short sentences.

"Tempestt is so reliable and consistent," Williams said. "In every drill and every practice she goes as hard as she can."

Williams, Wilson, and the rest of the Coyotes begin Summit League Tournament play this weekend in Sioux Falls.

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
