The Yankton City Commission will hear an engineering report tonight (Monday) regarding the potential for an estimated \$28.7 million in upgrades to the community's water system.

On the table are water treatment plant improvements and the development of a new source of water.

This is probably the biggest undertaking that I've been involved with since being at the city," Mayor Nancy Wenande said during a media briefing Friday.

In addition to the report from HDR, Inc., the commission will consider applying for approximately \$28.7 million in Drinking Water State Revolving Fund Loan Program funds at a rate of 3 percent for 20 years.

Wenande said nothing is set in stone at this point, and among the options being considered is a partnership with B-Y Water. Although no one has forgotten

the lawsuit B-Y filed against the City of Yankton several years ago and the resulting settlement, she said officials from both organizations are not letting that past dictate their future relationship.

"B-Y has offered several different scenarios to us, and we're taking a serious look at all of them," Wenande that," she stated. "How that will look, I don't know. It's a hard pill to swallow, but for water, I think people will understand. They have to have it." In other business, the city will

Commission rezoned 36 acres from rural-transitional to a planned unit development to make way for the construction of the greenhouse and fish production facility. It was also to include a worm farm, an aquatic culture area, a shop/office area, a retail center and possibly a restaurant.

At the time, Golden projected it could take five years to complete. During last week's commission meeting, he said other projects had delayed progress on Heartland Harvest Farms. Golden told the commission

that he believes the property may now be of interest to Yankton County. That property is probably the

"Ninety percent of all the wind development in the nation has occurred in states with an RPS," Cwach said. "You can't ignore that kind of fact.'

Cwach said there are two primary arguments that have kept South Dakota legislators from adopting an RPS.

First, some legislators didn't like the idea of forcing the utilities to do something. "To me, that's an absurd argu-

ment because state government forces utilities to do a lot of things," Cwach said. "A utility cannot increase its rates without the approval of the state, for example."

The second concern is that an RPS will cause electricity prices to rise significantly.

However, the study by Cwach and Baldwin found that the adoption of an RPS leads to a one-time .68 of a cent increase in the price of a kilowatt of electricity, and the effect in subsequent years is estimated at .16 of a cent per kilowatt.

"I think we would all be willing to live with a .16-cent increase if we knew we were going to get 160 megawatts of wind energy development every year," Cwach said.

to the study's finding that states with an RPS realize that much in additional wind capacity development each year compared to states without one.

That would mean more than 3,000 temporary jobs lasting up to a year and 16 new, permanent jobs annually, according to Cwach and Baldwin. In addition, those jobs pay 13 percent higher than the median for all jobs in South Dakota.

Steve Wegman, the former executive director of the South Dakota Wind Energy Association and now an analyst for the organization, said the study is a tool for creating awareness of some important issues.

There has always been a debate about objectives and RPS's," he stated. "Personally, I'm kind of torn between the two. But you've got to have a reward. If there is not an incentive (for renewable energy development), it isn't going to happen." Wegman believes that in order to

really work, the federal government needs to establish a national RPS. At the state level, RPS's become diluted and goals aren't met, he said.

Because of a variety of challenges, Wegman said he doesn't expect any big changes in South Dakota's wind energy resources in the near future.

In the article, Cwach and Baldwin discuss a group of investors and landowners in Bon Homme, Charles Mix, Douglas and Hutchinson counties that have leased 30,000 acres to support a wind farm. They argue the project would have a much better chance of moving forward if South Dakota had an RPS

"They already have approval from the Western Area Power Administration to interconnect to their grid," Cwach said. "Their number one problem is, they can't find a buyer. No utility is interested in investing in the wind farm because they have no reason to do it." The study concludes that "South

Dakotans would benefit immensely from the implementation of a state RPS. Unlike the RRCEO, an RPS would encourage our retail electricity providers to finally develop our renewable energy resources to serve South Dakota consumers while not significantly impacting retail utility rates for consumers. At the same time, an RPS provides well-paying jobs in rural South Dakota. Cwach said he hopes state legis-

lators read the study.

"I would love to have a serious conversation about these issues and see the interest groups in the state start advocating for an RPS," he stated. "It's the right thing to do. I would like to see the policy changed in the next legislative session."
