Hackemer Named Chair Of USD Dept. Of History

VERMILLION — The University of South Dakota announces that Kurt Hackemer, Ph.D., has been named chair of the USD Department of History beginning the 2013-14 academic year.

Hackemer currently serves as associate vice president of academic affairs and as a professor of history. His administrative experience is extensive at USD and includes serving as interim director of diversity from 2010-12; interim Registrar from 2011-12; associate dean of the College of Arts & Sciences, 2001-10; and acting chair, department of American Indian Studies from 2007-08. A member of the faculty at USD since 1996, Hackemer will replace Judith Sebesta, Ph.D., who will retire in May.

"Kurt's commitment to education, his significant experience with history and the respect he has earned from colleagues and the community makes him a perfect fit to serve as chair of the Department of History," stated Chuck Staben, Ph.D., provost and vice president for academic affairs at the University of South Dakota.

In addition to administration posts at USD, Hackemer has teaching experience in undergraduate and graduate education, and is the author of several articles and two books: "To Rescue My Native Land: The Civil War Letters of William T. Shepherd, First Illinois Light Artillery" and "The U.S. Navy and the Origins of the Military-Industrial Complex." Prior to USD, he was a lecturer at Texas A&M University from 1993-96. He received a Ph.D. and M.A. in history from Texas A&M, and a B.A. in history from the University of Chicago.

USD Symposium To Address Ag Antitrust Issues

VERMILLION — The South Dakota Law Review and the University of South Dakota School of Law will host the 2013 South Dakota Law Review Symposium on Friday, March 15, beginning at 10 a.m. with the first panel discussion in the USD Law School courtroom. A second panel discussion is scheduled for 2 p.m. in the courtroom.

Panelists will discuss antitrust and competition issues in agricultural markets and the new era of antitrust enforcement in agricultural and other rural markets of the Midwest. The 10 a.m. panel, "Antitrust and Competition Issues in America's Heartland," features David A. Balto, an antitrust lawyer in Washington, D.C.; Bill Bullard, former rancher in Perkins County and chief executive officer of R-CALF USA; Peter C. Carstensen, professor of antitrust law at the University of Wisconsin Law School; Milton A. Marquis, a partner at Dickstein Shapiro L.L.P. in Washington D.C.; and Dr. Diana L. Moss, vice president, director, and senior research fellow of the American Antitrust Institute.

At 2 p.m., Thomas J. Horton, associate professor of law at the USD School of Law; Dr. James W. Brock, Bill R. Moeckel Professor of Economics at Miami University in Oxford, Ohio; Jesse W. Markham Jr., Marshall P. Madison Professor of Law at the University of San Francisco School of Law; and Maurice E. Stucke, professor of law at the University of Tennessee College of Law, will lead the panel, "New Approaches to Antitrust and Their Potential Implications for America's Heartland."

CHICAGO (AP) — Grains futures mostly rose Monday on the Chicago Board of Trade.

Wheat for May delivery rose 3 cents to \$7 a bushel; May corn rose 7.75 cents to \$7.125 a bushel; May oats rose 5 cents to \$3.93 a bushel; while May soybeans rose 8.50 cents to \$14.7950 a bushel.

Beef prices rose, while pork prices fell on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange.

April live cattle rose 0.57 cent to \$1.2812 a pound; April feeder cattle rose 0.02 cent to \$1.4137 a pound; April lean hogs fell 0.87 cent to 81.15 cents a pound.
