Two Men Arrested On Marijuana Charges BY NATHAN JOHNSON

Two area men were arrested late last month in relation to a shipment of high-grade marijuana, according to Yankton County Sheriff Jim Vlahakis.

The arrest information was released this week after an investigation into the matter was completed.

Deth Joe Chanthachak, 26, Gayville, was arrested Feb. 28 for possession of marijuana (one to 10 pounds), possession with intent to distribute marijuana (one pound or more) and a parole hold.

Jamie Edward Hejna, 33, Yankton, was arrested Feb. 28 for possession of marijuana (two ounces or less) and possession of drug paraphernalia. He may face additional charges, Vlahakis said.

An approximately 2-pound shipment of high-grade marijuana valued at \$8,000-\$10,000 was intercepted, and a subsequent search warrant was done Feb. 28 of Hejna's home in Timberland Park.

Vlahakis said the quantity of the marijuana confiscated wasn't exceptional for the Yankton area, but the quality of it was.

The investigation was conducted by the sheriff's office, the Yankton Police Department and the South Dakota Division of Criminal Investigation.

As director of prison operations. Dooley will serve as the chief warden and oversee the management of all adult facilities in South Dakota. His responsibilities include the penitentiary in Sioux Falls and the women's prison in Pierre.

"I will be traveling more than I do now," he said. "I will spend at least one day each week at the prison in Sioux Falls and (make) occasional trips to Pierre and Rapid City.'

However, Dooley believes he will receive excellent back-up in taking on the extra duties.

"Corrections and support staff of the SDDOC are an exceptionally highly trained group of professionals dedicated to what they do, and it is an honor and privi-

lege to serve with them and take on this new leadership role," he said.

"The current director, Warden Doug Weber, has established an excellence in Corrections in South Dakota by setting the bar very high, and my challenge is to ensure we maintain those standards."

In a news release announcing Dooley's selection for his new role. Corrections Secretary Denny Kaemingk lauded the warden's long tenure with the SDDOC.

Dooley began his corrections career at the state penitentiary in Sioux Falls in 1983. He moved to Springfield the following year to assist with converting the University of South Dakota/Špringfield campus into a prison. He worked his way up through the security ranks and was named warden of the Springfield facility in 1995.

Bob Dooley is an outstanding warden and has a long and fruitful career with the Department of Corrections," Kaemingk said. "I

am confident that he will do an excellent job in his new position."

Dooley said he won't be responsible for implementing South Dakota's new criminal justice initiative. However, the initiative's outcome will directly affect his work.

The effort to reform South Dakota's criminal justice system could help prevent the building of two prisons in the next decade.

The challenge remains large, given the numbers. The state currently spends \$102 million on its corrections budget annually, compared to \$19 million in 1980.

The South Dakota prison population has grown from about 600 inmates in 1980 to more than 3,600 today. If the state does not contain that growth, it is estimated the prison population will exceed 4,500 inmates by 2022, at a cost of more than \$224 million to taxpayers.

Whatever the future holds, Dooley told the Press & Dakotan he feels prepared to handle his new duties.

He has tackled major projects at MDSP, such as the conversion into a prison and the expansion of the facility from its former 800 inmates to the current 1,200. MDSP also offers a number of inmate work programs, including the construction of housing units.

"I started in corrections in South Dakota almost 30 years ago as a correctional officer at the South Dakota State Penitentiary," he said. "I transferred to MDSP as a lieutenant when we first opened the prison in 1984, and I was fortunate enough to move up the security ranks until I was appointed warden 18 years ago.

"This background has given me a broad understanding of corrections from all aspects of the profession."

wounded in the incident. Kokesh died Feb. 7, 2006, as a result of injuries from the explosion.

"I don't think there's any way to prepare yourself for hearing that," Kay said.

From that moment on, she knew her family's life would never be the same.

Not only had she lost her husband, but her two children, Keely and Koby, had also lost their father.

"It was hard because the kids needed a dad, and we didn't have one anymore," Kay said.

Kay learned to serve the roles of both mother and father, which meant handling every task, from helping with homework to mowing the lawn and removing snow.

"I had to try and pick up on all the men chores," she said.

For support, Kay turned to family and friends. She and her sons later moved from Tabor to

Yankton to be closer to both. 'They've been there if I've needed anything," Kay said. "That's the biggest thing that has helped me through this.³

While her family has had to deal with the loss of Richard, Kav said she doesn't regret his involvement with the National Guard, as she knew how important it was to him.

"He loved going to Guards," she said. "He wanted to go over to Iraq, so there wouldn't have been any stopping him. He said, 'I'm going to go and do my duty. I signed up for it."

With next week marking the 10th anniversary of the U.S. beginning combat operations in Iraq, Kay asks that everyone remember the soldiers that gave their lives to the war, just as her family does with Richard.

"We keep him alive with us," she said. "We have pictures of him. We talk about him all the time, like, 'Oh wow, Dad would have done this,' or 'Oh wow, look at the snow. Dad would have loved to go out and shovel the snow.' It's the little things we do

to keep in touch with him."

The family also returns to Tabor each summer to celebrate the annual Rich Schild Memorial Fireworks Display. The event was started by the Schilds' neighbors in Tabor to honor Richard, who enjoyed shooting fireworks whenever he could, Kay said.

"It's a great show, and it's great for remembering him," she said. "Everybody talks about him there and how he was an energetic, outgoing person. He would do anything for anybody that needed help.'

Kay added that while it is important for her family to remember Richard and what he meant to them, she also knows they need to move forward.

"Some days I can sit and think about him all day. But other days, you just have to get on with your life," she said. "He wouldn't want us to just do nothing. He would want us to keep going.'
