Also, any material changes in the program's personnel or protocols must be reported to all law enforcement agencies with jurisdiction over the school grounds.

Even though the sheriff's department has jurisdiction in all parts of the county, Vlahakis said it is likely the intent of the law that the police department would be the primary law enforcement agency that the Yankton School District would work with through the process. The sheriff's office would be the primary agency for the Gayville-Volin School District.

With law enforcement relatively close to the schools in Yankton County, Vlahakis said he doesn't believe there is much need for sentinels here.

"At the same time, when you get to West River, where the closest law enforcement may be an hour or so away, what are you going to do?" he added.

Paulsen said he has various problems with the law and opposed it from the start. For example, he believes the law asks law enforcement agencies to perform background checks on potential sentinels.

"There are federal regulations out there that say we can only do background checks for law enforcement candidates," Paulsen stated. "We can't even check employees for other city departments. Yet, now they're telling us we have to do it. It doesn't seem like there was a lot of forethought put in this by the Legislature."

The law completely changes the mindset of law enforcement when responding to a shooting at a school, he added.

"We've trained for years for immediate action (to stop the threat). That basically meant shoot to kill," Paulsen said. "Now,

they're saying, 'Go in, see somebody with a gun, wait and determine if that person is there lawfully.' It puts everybody at risk. In a high-stress situation, we now would have to manage people who have weapons."

Sentinels will be required to complete a training course as defined by the Law Enforcement Officers Standards Commission, but Paulsen doesn't know if it will be enough to prepare them for a real-life shooting situation.

"If you put a teacher or other school employee in a high-stress situation with limited training, are they going to be startled by law enforcement?" he asked. "Potentially, in a situation like this, you will have officers from various law enforcement agencies responding in plain clothes."

If the sentinel raises a gun at one of those officers and makes them feel threatened, it could lead to a tragedy.

"Once the officer feels threatened and that gun is pointed at them, they are able to shoot," Paulsen said.

Vlahakis said one reason the South Dakota Sheriffs' Association did not oppose the legislation was that it included a clause clearing law enforcement of legal liability should an injury result from a sentinel program.

The law states, "No law enforcement officer or county sheriff, nor the Law Enforcement Officers Standards Commission, Division of Criminal Investigation, Office of Attorney General, the State of South Dakota, nor any agents, employees, or members thereof, is liable for any injury caused by, related to, or resulting from: (1) The implementation of the school sentinel program established by this Act ..."

Vlahakis said he'll be curious to see how many school districts end up implementing a sentinel program.

Harry Reid, D-Nev., said he will decide soon how to bring the measures to the chamber, where debate is expected next month.

"Americans are looking to us for solutions and for action," said Senate Judiciary Committee Chairman Patrick Leahy, D-Vt. He said that despite gun-rights advocates' claims, the Second Amendment's right to bear arms is not at risk, but "lives are at risk" unless lawmakers can figure out how to keep firearms away from dangerous people.

The other bills would require federal background checks to more would-be gun buyers, make it easier for authorities to prosecute illegal gun traffickers and boost school safety aid.

In a written statement, President Barack Obama thanked senators "for taking another step forward in our common effort to help reduce gun violence" and said Congress should vote on all the proposals. He said assault weapons "are designed for the battlefield, and they have no place on our streets, in our schools, or threatening our law enforcement officers."

Barring assault weapons was part of Obama's plan for reducing gun violence. But banning the high-powered weapons has encountered strong opposition from congressional Republicans and elicited little enthusiasm among moderate Democratic senators up for re-election next year in GOP-leaning states in the West and South.

The measure's sponsor, Sen. Dianne Feinstein, D-Calif., and her supporters say the ban would help elimi-

nate the type of firearms and magazines that have been used with deadly effect at Newtown and several other recent mass shootings. Opponents say barring the guns would violate the right to bear arms and have little overall impact because assault weapons are involved in small percentages of gun crimes.

At one point Thursday, Feinstein responded angrily after Sen. Ted Cruz, R-Texas, asked if she would also support limiting the First Amendment's freedom of speech by denying its protection to some books. "I'm not a sixth grader. Senator, I've been on this committee for 20 years" and studied the issue for a long time, she told Cruz. She later added: "It's fine you want to lecture me on the Constitution. I appreciate it. Just know I've been

here a long time."

Cruz, an outspoken conservative freshman, answered, "Nobody doubts her sincerity and her passion and yet at the same time, I'd note she chose not to answer the question."

"The answer is obvious — no," Feinstein said later.

She and other Democrats also argued that there are limits on many constitutional rights. Leahy said the state Board of Education in Cruz's home state "has told people what books they should or shouldn't read" — a reference to that conservative-led board that controls the state's school curriculum standards.

Cruz said lawmakers should make decisions about gun legislation using "facts and data and by the Constitution, not by passion."
