Also, any material changes in the program's personnel or protocols must be reported to all law enforcement agencies with jurisdiction over the school grounds.

Even though the sheriff's department has jurisdiction in all parts of the county, Vlahakis said it is likely the intent of the law that the police department would be the primary law enforcement agency that the Yankton School District would work with through the process. The sheriff's office would be the primary agency for the Gayville-Volin School District.

With law enforcement relatively close to the schools in Yankton County, Vlahakis said he doesn't believe there is much need for sentinels here.

"At the same time, when you get to West River, where the closest law enforcement may be an hour or so away, what are you going to do?" he added.

Paulsen said he has various problems with the law and opposed it from the start. For example, he believes the law asks

law enforcement agencies to perform background checks on potential sentinels. "There are federal regulations out there that say we can only do background checks

for law enforcement candidates," Paulsen stated. "We can't even check employees for other city departments. Yet, now they're telling us we have to do it. It doesn't seem like there was a lot of forethought put in this by the Legislature.

The law completely changes the mindset of law enforcement when responding to a shooting at a school, he added.

"We've trained for years for immediate action (to stop the threat). That basically meant shoot to kill," Paulsen said. "Now,

they're saying, 'Go in, see somebody with a gun, wait and determine if that person is there lawfully.' It puts everybody at risk. In a high-stress situation, we now would have to manage people who have weapons."

Sentinels will be required to complete a training course as defined by the Law Enforcement Officers Standards Commission, but Paulsen doesn't know if it will be enough to prepare them for a real-life shooting situation.

"If you put a teacher or other school employee in a high-stress situation with limited training, are they going to be startled by law enforcement?" he asked. "Potentially, in a situation like this, you will have officers from various law enforcement agencies responding in plain clothes."

If the sentinel raises a gun at one of those officers and makes them feel threatened, it could lead to a tragedy.

"Once the officer feels threatened and that gun is pointed at them, they are able to shoot," Paulsen said.

Vlahakis said one reason the South Dakota Sheriffs' Association did not oppose the legislation was that it included a clause clearing law enforcement of legal liability should an injury result from a sentinel program.

The law states, "No law enforcement officer or county sheriff, nor the Law Enforcement Officers Standards Commission, Division of Criminal Investigation, Office of Attorney General, the State of South Dakota, nor any agents, employees, or members thereof, is liable for any injury caused by, related to, or resulting from: (1) The implementation of the school sentinel program established by this Act ...'

Vlahakis såid he'll be curious to see how many school districts end up implementing a sentinel program.

Weekly U.S. Jobless Aid Applications Fall To 332,000 WASHINGTON (AP) — Fewer Americans sought unemploy-

ment aid last week, reducing the average number of weekly applications last month to a five-year low. The drop shows that fewer layoffs are strengthening the job market. The Labor Department said Thursday that applications fell

10,000 to a seasonally adjusted 332,000. That cut the four-week average to 346,750, the lowest since March 2008, just several months after the Great Recession began. The report "provides further evidence of a gradual strength-

ening in labor market conditions," Paul Dales, senior U.S. economist at Capital Economics, said in a note to clients. Applications are a proxy for layoffs. They have fallen nearly 13 percent since November.

At the same time, net hiring has picked up. Employers have

added an average of 200,000 jobs per month from November through February, up from about 150,000 a month in the previous four months. The unemployment rate fell to a four-year low of 7.7 percent

in February from 7.9 percent the previous month. About 5.6 million people received benefits in the week ended Feb. 23, the latest data available. That's about 220,000 more than the previous week The improvement in the job market shows employers aren't

laying off more workers because of worries about higher taxes or government spending cuts. In January, Social Security taxes rose two percentage points. Someone earning \$50,000 has about \$1,000 less to spend in 2013. A household with two high-paid workers has up to \$4,500 less.

On March 1, \$44 billion in across-the-board government spending cuts started after the White House and Congress failed

to reach a deal to avoid the reductions. Higher taxes haven't prevented Americans from spending more. Retail sales jumped in February by the most in five months, the Commerce Department said Wednesday. Much of the increase reflected higher gas prices But even excluding the volatile categories of gas, autos and building supply stores, socalled core retail sales rose strongly.

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
