Senior guard Michael Rucker and junior forward JJ Hejna each received Honorable Mention for their efforts this past season. Rucker and Hejna helped chaperon the Bucks to regional play in the post-season and a 6-15 record this past season.

'Ît's such an honor because everyone on the team is very good and well deserving," Rucker

Rucker averaged nine points per game and snagged four rebounds per game for Yankton.

When asked about his best advantage to the team, he was optimistic about his attitude towards

a struggling squad. "I'd say my best asset was leading everyone and helping everyone stay on the same page," Rucker said. "I just tried to instill positive thoughts all year.'

"Well first off, he has good leadership qualities, which helped throughout the entire year," Yankton head coach Chris Haynes said. "The biggest thing, on the court, was his ability to shoot the basketball was good for us. Offensively, he opened up the inside and got easy looks for our big guys. When Michael did well scoring and shooting we had our best games."

Rucker had his best game of the year against then number-two ranked Sioux Falls Lincoln Patriots. The Bucks defeated the Patriots 56-53 behind 16 points from Rucker. He produced nine of his 16 in the final minutes, to seal-the-deal on the Patriots.

"We're going to miss Michael," Haynes said. "He's such a good kid, and represents our program how we want our kids to act on and off the floor."

Rucker was a two-year varsity player, earning to start for the Bucks in the second half of his junior season.

"I'm going to miss playing with my friends and the coaches," he said. "I wish we could have had the chance to play in the state tournament." Hejna was the leading scorer

for the Bucks this season, boasting 10 points and eight rebounds

'JJ was overall best player," Haynes said." He led us in scoring and rebounding, and was a tough matchup. While playing the four, he was a little bigger than the opponents and while playing the five he used his quickness to his advantage."

Hejna had his best performance against the Huron Tigers early in the season. The Bucks defeated the Tigers 46-43, behind Hejna's 18 points and 11 rebounds.

"He was going up against one of the best players in the state, Justin Decker (a USD verbal commit)," Haynes said. "That game helped him realized that he can play with anyone in the state."

Haynes will expect Hejna to not only step-up his game on the court, but show his three year veteran varsity experience as a leader next season.

Third Time Not A Charm

Viborg-Hurley Falls In Final In Third Straight Season As White River Repeats

ABERDEEN — If the third time is a charm, it wasn't for the Viborg-Hurley Cougars.

The Viborg-Hurley boys' basketball program ended its season with a loss in the state championship game for a third consecutive season, dropping a 63-51 decision to White River in the S.D. Class B championship on Saturday at the Barnett Center.

The title was the fourth in six season for the Tigers, who have made a S.D. record six straight title game appearances.

'I'm happy for our seniors," said White River head coach Eldon Marshall. "I'm glad for them to finish out like this.'

Joe Cameron scored a gamehigh 18 points, Wyatt Krogman scored 16 points and Nic Waln had 10 points for White River, with all three earning all-tournament honors. Krogman also had six assists and Tavis Burbank had 10 points for White River, which finished with a 25-1 record.

Tyler Gerdes scored 15 points and Trevor Jacobsen had 14 points for Viborg-Hurley, which finished at 23-3. Jacobsen and Hora, who had eight rebounds, were also named to the all-tournament team.

Jacobsen finished drives to the basket on consecutive possession to get the Cougars on the board, and a Hora score in the post left Viborg-Hurley up 6-2.
