

# Meals On Wheels Serving Up For A Good Cause

Since 2002 the Meals on Wheels programs across the United States have joined together during the month of March to raise awareness about senior hunger in their communities by connecting local businesses and public officials with Senior Nutrition Programs. The annual March for Meals campaign helps sustain the Meals on Wheels program in Yankton.

The Meals on Wheels program serves more than 18,500 meals in a year to seniors and those who are disabled, who are homebound. The Center also serves over 21,000 meals a year in the facility.

"Many of the recipients of these meals are below the poverty level and need financial assistance. The March for Meals campaign coupled with United Way funding enables us to assist those in need. It also takes a lot of volunteers to fulfill our mission," said Center director Christy Hauer.

The Meals on Wheels delivery process is a community wide effort, there are many volunteers from First Dakota Bank, Lewis and Clark Realty, MOPS, Mount Marty College, Christ Episcopal Church, Christ the King Church, Sacred Heart and St. Benedict's Church, Trinity Lutheran Church, United Church of Christ, and United Methodist Church. There are numerous individual volunteers who occasionally deliver meals as well as those who have regularly scheduled routes.
