MMC Baseball Looking For Better Start, Finish

Lancers Hope To Defend GPAC **Tourney Title**

Mount Marty College head baseball coach Andy Bernatow called the 2012 season, "A great story of perseverence." This season, he was hoping

for a lot less drama and a little more success, but Mother Nature had other ideas.

MMC (6-12 in 2013) returns five position players and two conference starters from a team that went 27-28 a year ago, using a run of 13 victories in 15 games to make the Great Plains Athletic Conference Tournament, then go undefeated in that tournament.

"It definitely was an interesting season, a lot of twists and turns," Bernatow said of the 2012 campaign, which saw the Lancers qualify for the NAIA Opening Round for the second time in three years. "We saw the lowest of lows and, in the same season, the highest of highs." But Bernatow feels that this

season may be even better. "I know I say it a lot, but this

could be a special year," he said. "We can compete with a lot of teams in the conference, and the conference looks as good as any year I've been here.

The success of recent years has the team hungry for more, according to senior Mathias Godsil.

"All the new kids know that it is expected for Mount Marty to be a winning organization," he said. "It is expected that we can do well in the GPAC and go on in the national tournament." Two members of last season's

regular rotation, senior Cassidy Key-Darlington (2-1, 4.67 ERA, 19K in 27 IP) and Dominic Wieseler (1-1, 4.35 ERA, 27 K in 20 2/3 IP), return to anchor the Lancers' league starters.

Cassidy threw as well as anyone in the back half of the season. Dom was throwing strong in the first half," Bernatow said. "The two of them can provide a lot of good innings." Transfer A.J. Griffith (Great

Falls, Mont.; 1-3, 5.48 ERA, 19K in 21 1/3 IP) and freshman Asau Rodriguez (Rapid City; 0-1, 8.16 ERA, 12K 14 1/3 IP) have also looked strong in the early going.

Sophomores Ryan Buck (.324, 5 RBI) and Riley Stack (.240), who saw time as courtesy runners a year ago, could also be in the infield mix, as could freshman Alex Mueller (Yankton).

Senior Kyler Pekarek (.152, 6 RBI) returns behind the plate, with sophomore Nick Sehr (.333, 3 RBI, a converted infielder, and transfer Julian Cutolo (McCook CC) also potentially in the Lancers' two-catcher rotation.

"Kyler does a pretty good job of working with the pitchers, working with the other catchers. He's starting to throw better," Bernatow said. "Nick Sehr has a natural catcher's throwing motion, and in our conference you have to be able to be able to throw out runners. Julian swings the bat well, and will probably

get a lot of bats as the DH." Godsil (.348, 10 RBI), who earned honorable mention all-GPAC honors, and sophomore Zac Hollenback (.343, 5 doubles, 2 triples, 8 RBI) return to anchor right and center field.

'Godsil is a three-year starter who has a good arm and has done a good job at the plate," Bernatow said. "Hollenback does a good job of patrolling the outfield.'

adapt to throwing at the collegiate level. According to Fernandez, all four prospective pitchers will get a chance to prove themselves.

"With the amount of games we are playing (44), more than likely all four pitchers will get some starts and they are going to have to be able to throw some innings,'

the eighth-year coach said.

Either way, the Lancers will know quickly how their season will progress as Mount Marty attempts to squeeze their entire conference regular season into the next six weeks.

A trio of Lancers are leading the way offensively thus far, as Lonneman (.444), Jamie Gregory (.368) and Cardenas (.308) are all hitting above .300 after the spring break trip. Bunde leads the team in runs batted in with four while Cardenas has knocked in three teammates in her seven starts.

On the mound, Katie Groteluschen has pitched nine innings and allowed just four earned runs (3.11 ÉRA) while Courtney Hansen has been the workhorse of the group of freshman, logging 19.1 innings so far with a 5.70 ERA.

If the Lancers attain their goal of finishing the year in the top eight in league standings, GPAC tournament play is in Sioux City from May 2-4.
