# N.D. Senate Votes Down Guns In Schools Measure

BISMARCK, N.D. (AP) — The North Dakota Senate on Thursday voted down measures allowing concealed-weapon permit holders to carry guns at schools or public gatherings, but approved a bill that would let those with permits to pack firearms in church.

All three measures easily passed the state House last month. The Senate was more critical of the proposals, questioning whether more guns would lead to accidental shootings and put weapons in the hands of people not adequately trained to react in emergencies.

However, senators offered no clear explanation for why they chose to pass the bill allowing people with permits to bring their guns to church. That measure will now go to Republican Gov. Jack Dalrymple.

Sen. Carolyn Nelson, D-Fargo, said obtaining a concealed-carry permit in North Dakota consists of an open-book test and a few hours of instruction.

"Maybe even I could pass it and I'm partially blind and don't like guns," she said. Sen. Stanley Lyson, R-Williston, said he

doubts that allowing concealed weapons in public places improves safety for citizens. "Guns are not the answer in all of these gatherings," said Lyson, a former Williams

County sheriff who has a concealed-carry permit.

Supporters of the gun-rights measures have said the aim was to create an efficier and cost effective way to protect people.

Supporters of the gun-rights measures have said the aim was to create an efficient and cost-effective way to protect people and to prevent tragedies such as December's shooting at Sandy Hook Elementary in Newtown, Conn., in which 20 students and six educators died.

In testimony held earlier on the meas-

ures, education officials and teachers opposed allowing guns in North Dakota schools. And members of education and religious groups told lawmakers that schools and churches would be open to potential lawsuits and increased insurance costs.

lawsuits and increased insurance costs.
Under the measures, those with concealed-weapon permits would be allowed to carry guns inside schools or churches only if officials at the buildings permitted it.

Sen. Bill Bowman, R-Bowman, said allowing an authorized person to pack a weapon would be helpful at schools in rural, sparsely populated counties. For example, Bowman County, where he lives, only has a sheriff and one deputy.

"If someone started shooting, how many would he shoot before someone could be there to protect them?" he said.

Senators defeated the guns in schools measure 27-18, a sharp contrast to their 28-17 vote in favor of allowing weapons in places of worship.

Sen. Lyson, the former sheriff, also questioned the need for parishioners to be packing guns, even if approved by church officials

"Why would we want to have weapons in church?" he said. "What are we worried about in our churches?"

The number of concealed-carry permits in North Dakota has quadrupled in the past decade, to more than 22,000. State Bureau of Criminal Investigation records show the agency issued 12,614 concealed-carry permits in 2012, up from 5,634 in 2011.

Permits are on the rise statewide, especially in the oil patch communities of western North Dakota, data show.

# Neither Party Has Cash For Student Loan Rate Fix WASHINGTON (AP) — Incoming much outcry," said Justin Draeger, taken from commercial lenders.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Incoming college freshmen could end up paying \$5,000 more for the same student loans their older siblings have if Congress doesn't stop interest rates from doubling.

Sound familiar? The same warnings came last year. But now the presidential election is over and mandatory budget cuts are taking place, making a deal to avert a doubling of interest rates much more elusive before a July 1 deadline.

"What is definitely clear, this time around, there doesn't seem to be as

much outcry," said Justin Draeger, president of the National Association of Student Financial Aid Administrators. "We're advising our members to tell students that the interest rates are going to double on new student loans, to 6.8 percent."

That rate hike only hits students taking out new subsidized loans. Students with outstanding subsidized loans are not expected to see their loan rates increase unless they take out a new subsidized Stafford loan. Students' non-subsidized loans are not expected to change, nor are loans

The difference between 3.4 percent

and 6.8 percent interest rates is a \$6 billion tab for taxpayers — set against a backdrop of budget negotiations that have pitted the two parties in a standoff. President Barack Obama is expected to release his budget proposal in the coming weeks, adding another perspective to the debate.

Last year, with the presidential and congressional elections looming, students got a one-year reprieve on the doubling of interest rates. That expires July 1.

Vig's sense of commitment, engagement and joy for life are qualities that led to his selection for the Frank Yaggie Award. The honor is presented annually to an individual who has shown a total commitment to making Yankton the best that it can be.

Vig was born in Veblen, in the northeastern corner of South Dakota. He received his bachelor's degree in civil engineering from the South Dakota School of Mines and Technology in Rapid City. He moved to Yankton in 1973 and worked for Morgen Manufacturing for 20 years before moving to South Carolina in 1993. The absence was brief, however, as he returned a year later.

Vig has been a leader in the aggregate and concrete industry for almost 40 years. Before becoming president of Kolberg-Pioneer, Inc. in 2001, he served as the company's engineering manager. He currently serves as group vice president for KPI-JCI and Astec Mobile Screens.

"Astec really believes in Kolberg-Pioneer and the Yankton community." he said. "They put a lot of dollars in here with their plant expansion."

Kolberg-Pioneer has shown the ability to weather the economic storms of recent years, Vig said. At one time, the plant employed about 500 workers before downsizing to 300. The operation has rebounded and now employs 410 associates.

The company operates with the core values of honesty, integrity and respect of all individuals, Vig said. "We work to be a good neighbor," he said.

In many ways, his community service reflects those ideals, and he encourages strong involvement by all Yankton residents.

He has remained a strong supporter of the Yankton Baseball Association, serving on the board for six years. He has also been active in the Yankton Morning Optimist and with Yankton Basketball Inc. with the Roger Haas tournaments. be wired to a certain number. In both cases, the caller would talk in a muffled voice that was very hard to distinguish.

In another case, one of Saunders' soccer players, who was in high school at the time, had this happened to his grandmother.

"The scammers called his grand-

"The scammers called his grandmother and said he was out of the country and needed money wired immediately in order to get back into the United States," she said. "In both situations, the money never got wired over. One of the ladies said her bank wouldn't allow her to do it because it was a scam; in the other situation, Western Union said this number is incorrect and this is a scam."

Paulsen said there are a number of scams floating around.

"It's tough to nail down a lot of the specific scams out there because there are so many of them, but this one with the bond money is a big one," he said. "It's probably happening every day, but a lot of times it's not getting reported. Unfortunately, there isn't much that can be done be-

sides document the case."

Paulsen added that it's difficult to do much about the scams because, in most cases, victims are being called from phone numbers that cannot be tracked. In addition, the numbers to which the money is to be wired are also impossible to track.

"If people get a call, they need to call the police and let us know that it's going on and it happened to them," he said. "This is a good one to let the public know about because it's happening a lot in the area."
