In my 20-plus years of covering high school sports, I've learned a couple of things. One of these things is that a lot of local wrestlers will do at the South Dakota State Class B Wrestling Tournament.

But Saturday night at the Barnett Center might have been as crazy a night as I've seen. A local team champion, scoring one of the biggest point

totals in state meet history. (Parkston finished six points behind the state record it set a year ago.)

Nine area wrestlers in championship matches. Two area

wrestlers faced off against each other. - EIGHT area champions from five of the nine area pro-

rams represented at state: Bon Homme-Scotland (3), Beresford (2), Parkston (1), Wagner (1) and Elk Point-Jefferson (1). Two wrestlers who finished their seasons with unbeater records: Beresford's Dakota Galt (106) and Bon Homme-Scotland's Dan Stibral (285).

A crazy championship match at 195 that saw EPJ's Lukas Forsling turn a match that was on the way to a lop-sided loss to the top-ranked wrestler into a victory by pin. (He also beat the second and fourth ranked wrestlers in the tournament, and was named the meet's Outstanding Wrestler.)

Even the lower places were not immune from some exciting area news. Leo Hopkins, Andes Central's freshman 120-

pounder, had one stumble but put together a great tournament to finish third. I don't have records to verify when it last happened, but I know I don't remember the last wrestling medal for the Eagles — especially one that high. The Eagles had two other freshmen at state, as their program continues to build back up.

Throw in a pair of champions for the Vermillion boys in 'A,' and it was just a great weekend for area wrestlers, one of the better ones I've seen in a long time.

Wrestling may not be everyone's cup of tea, but there are few things that beat the energy and intensity of the state wrestling tournament. And when there are local young men claiming titles in exciting fashion, it makes it even more fun.
