### 'Women In Science' Set For March 12

SIOUX FALLS — Nearly 600 eighth-grade girls will gather for a "Women in Science" event at Southeast Tech in Sioux Falls on Wednesday, March 12, from 9 a.m.-2:30 p.m.

Thirty exhibitors will present technical career paths as well as 34 presenters (in science-related occupations) who will make half-hour presentations. The day is structured so that each girl will have the opportunity to hear at least five of the presentations and visit the exhibit room.

The Women in Science Conference is designed to promote a positive image and to stimulate interest in science and technology careers for young women. Women are historically under-represented in science and math-related fields. While women account for roughly half of the workforce, they hold less than 25 percent of jobs in these technological areas.

The forum is sponsored by the Women in Science organization, which is dedicated to achieving equity and full participation for women in science, mathematics, engineering and technology. The objective is to make young women aware of the opportunities available to them and to encourage them to pursue the math and science classes necessary to prepare them for careers in these fields. One of the best ways to promote students interest is by establishing personal connections with professional women already accomplished in scientific and technological careers. Young women participating in the Women in Science forum attend presentations by local doctors, veterinarians, pharmacists, zoologists, optometrists, dentists, nurses, ultrasound technologists, nutritionists, chemists, computer analysts, geographers and engineers. BROOKINGS — Food hubs are a relatively new concept in the realm of local foods. They are a step in the local foods system that allows producers to aggregate and distribute their products on a more regional level, and to market products to bigger venues such as restaurants and institutions via a food hub manager, explained Kari O'Neill, SDSU Extension Community Development Field Specialist.

O'Neill said that there has been interest in South Dakota to learn more about regional food hubs, and to explore the possibility of developing such a concept in the state. To address this interest, SDSU Extension, Dakota Rural Action, and the South Dakota Specialty Crop Producers have put together a video conferencing series that will provide more information to the public.

The 2-part series will be held on March 13 and March 27 from 6:30-9 p.m. CST at various locations throughout the state. The topic of the first session will be: "Clarifying the Regional Food Hub Concept," and will define what a regional food hub is, the services and activities they offer, and the market possibilities. The second session will focus on "Economic Viability of Regional Food Hubs," and will focus on the business aspects, available funding, and standards for products.

Marty Spence, manager of the "Stewards of the Land" food hub in rural Illinois will be a presenter on the video conference.

"Marty's experience in starting two food hubs and managing one for seven years will be helpful as we sort out possibilities for South Dakota. His facilitation style and practical farm background will keep listen-

series," O'Neill said. Economic developers, entrepreneurs, local food producers, and the general public are invited to attend this series at a site closest to them. Facilitators will be present to lead discussions at each site, with the option of site groups continuing to meet for further discussion following the conference.
