

South Dakota Beats SDSU 72-58 To Derail The Jackrabbits' Quest For A Sixth Straight Summit Title

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SIOUX FALLS — Tia Hemiller tried hard to shrug off the magnitue of a rather key win.

That lasted all of three seconds.

"It's just another game," the University of South Dakota sophomore said, eliciting laughter throughout the

"Not really, though." There was plenty of reason to celebrate in Coyote land on Monday afternoon, as USD upset — not to mention, dominate —five-time defending champion South Dakota State 72-58 in the semifinals of the Summit League Cham-

pionships. Not only did the Coyotes (18-13) hand the Jackrabbits (22-9) their first-ever loss in the Summit League Championships, USD moved to the final for a second straight year. The Coyotes will face sixth-seeded Denver, an overtime winner over secondseeded IUPUI, in today's (Tuesday) 1 p.m. final

"We want to be champions. We're always striving to be at that championship

level," Williams said. Up to this point, though the Jackrabbits have bested every challenger. Until Mon-

day.
"They have the target on their back," Williams said. "We've wanted to knock them off. They've raised the bar, and that continues to push

us to raise the bar." That attitude was evident big time on Monday.

Riding the high of a buzzer-beating win in the quarterfinals, the Coyotes came out strong — especially in the paint — and never looked back against SDSU.

USD's biggest area of dominance was down low, where it out-scored the more experienced Jacks 19-8 on secondchance opportunities. The Coyotes later said they took offense to being out-rebounded by 12 in a home loss to the Jacks over a week ago.

'We rebounded today. We had a want-to," senior Polly Harrington said. "We went after every rebound we could, and when we did that, we got the ball.

In a first half completely dominated by the team in red, the Coyotes controlled the scoring in paint to the tune of a 26-10 edge.

Ten of USD's rebounds were of the offensive variety, and that helped the Coyotes to a 37-25 lead at halftime quieting the Jackrabbit faith-

"In the first half, they just showed they had more engery than we did," said SDSU freshman Kerri Young, who had eight points off the

bench. "Coming out with a lot more energy and fire in the first half would have helped us a lot more.

As would have shooting, on either side. SDSU shot 32 percent, while USD shot 36 and just 1-of-13 on threepointers.

If there were any questions, though, that USD would falter once the Jacks made a run and their crowd started roaring, that was quickly put to rest. The Coyotes led by as

many as 23 points in the second half, and although SDSU cut it to 56-45 with 7:14 to

play, USD kept on rolling. So no, the Coyotes never really felt like a 23-point cush-ion was enough, Williams joked.

"I never felt comfortable. Not with a team like the Jacks," she said. "They made a nice run there, and we knew it was coming.

"I was glad we built the cushion we did, because we needed very point of it."

Once again, junior Nicole Seekamp had a big game,

USD's Miles Earns Regional Coach Of The Year Honor

VERMILLION — South Dakota's Derek Miles was named Midwest Region Women's Assistant Coach of the Year Monday by the U.S. Track & Field and Cross Country Coaches Association (USTFCCCA)

Miles, who is in his ninth season at USD, leads a duo of pole vaulters to the NCAA Indoor Championship Meet to be held Friday and Saturday in Albuquerque, N.M. Junior Emily Grove enters with the nation's top vault this season, a program-record mark of 14 feet, 9 1/2 inches. Senior Bethany Firsick, the defending national outdoor champion, enters with the 11th-best mark of 14-1.75. Together, the duo has combined to earn six All-America honors under

A native of Four Oaks, Calif., Miles was a five-time All-American in the pole vault at USD. He also qualified for the Division II national championships in the long jump, triple jump and decathlon during his collegiate career.

Post-collegiately, Miles was one of the best professional pole vaulters in the world for more than a decade. Miles is a three-time Olympian who finished fourth in Beijing in 2008 and seventh in Athens in 2004. He represented the United States on six world championship teams and was a three-time U.S. National Champion.

Miles has been enshrined into both the USD Hall of Fame and the USTFCCCA Division II Hall of Fame.

'Dons Derail Jackrabbits' Three-Peat Hopes

SIOUX FALLS — Fort Wayne denied South Dakota State a chance at a third consecutive NCAA Tournament appearance.

And in the process, ensured the Jackrabbits will not be represented in the championship round of the Summit League Championships.

The second-seeded Mastodons survived a tight men's semifinal contest, 64-60, on Monday night in front of another loud and involved crowd at the Sioux Falls Arena.

In reaching the finals for the first time in school history, Fort Wayne (24-9) ended SDSU's season short of the title game for the first time in three years

The Mastodons will face topseeded North Dakota State (24-4) in tonight's (Tuesday) 8 p.m. championship tilt, with the winner advancing to the NCAA Tournament.

Including the women's final at 1 p.m., today's Summit League championship games will not feature a Jackrabbit progam for the first time since both teams became eligible.

Fort Wayne, in beating the No. 3 Jackrabbit men, made ŠDSU pay for 18 turnovers, scoring 22 points off those mistakes.

Perhaps the biggest play of the game came on a Steve Forbes putback at the rim with 42.6 seconds left, giving Fort Wayne a 63-57

Softball: Lancers Carry Momentum Into 2014 Campaign

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It is not often that a 6-22 team can legitimately claim that they have momentum going into the next season. But that is the case for the Mount Marty College softball team, which opens the season on Wednesday in Tucson, Ariz.

The Lancers take a three-game win streak and a 5-5 finish from 2013, and return seven regulars who

started 20 or more games. "It carried over into the summer, and they all came back in the fall ready to play," said Mount Marty head coach Albert Fernandez, who enters his ninth season with the program. "We were picked last (in

the Great Plains Athletic Conference), which is always motivation. I think we can play with anybody.'

If there is anything that takes away from that momentum, it is some early injuries. Senior Michaela Bunde (.228, 6 doubles, 10 RBI) suffered a broken finger in the team's final scrimmage, and senior Sophia Lopez (.263, 5 doubles, 10 RBI) has also been fighting an injury.

Senior catcher Kristin Loutsch and junior infielder Lauren Orwig (.164, 4 RBI) are among the other key returning players for MMC. Juniors Karley Seuntjens (.167, 8 RBI) and Shaina Lonneman (.190) return, as do sophomores Maggie McMahan (.200), Olivia Rodriguez (.191, 7 RBI), Courtney Hansen (.156) and

Katie Groteluschen (.125).

While the team hit just .214 a year ago, they have looked better in preseason games and in practice.

"We're a lot further in the offensive game than we were this time a year ago," Orwig said. "It's been ex-

The Lancers also have a strong freshmen class, including area recruits Jessica Wirth (IF, Yankton), Karlee Kozak (IF, Tyndall), Beth Finnegan (OF, Newcastle, Neb.) and Tiffany Tramp (Fr., Crofton, Neb.). Amber Krause (P/OF, Tekamah, Neb.), Megan Meister (IF, Kingsley, Iowa), Emilie Pechacek (UTI, Omaha, Neb.) and Allison Roepke (P/IF, Sloan, Iowa) are also expected to be key contributors.

"We feel like we had a good recruiting class," Fernandez said. "They're very athlete, have good speed and are players who can play multiple positions.

Bunde has said that the younger talent has kept the veterans on their toes as well.

"Our freshman class is solid. Every one of them can hit the ball," she said. "Now we're two-deep at every position. It's really pushed everyone to

work harder to be better. Hansen (1-11, 7.54 ERA, 26 K in 69 2/3 IP) and Grotluschen (0-4, 8.40 ERA, 7 K in 18 1/3 IP) are looking stronger in their second season on the rubber. Krause has also been a strong addition to the pitching staff.

'They are looking good," Fernan-

dez said of the pitchers. "They've put a lot of time in on their mechanics, and have improved their velocity and movement.

The Lancers will play 10 games in Tucson, beginning with NAIA Purdue and Peru State on Wednesday. MMC will play 10 games in Arizona before returning home on March 22

to begin GPAC play against Doane. "We feel really good about where we're at," Fernandez said. "We've already done a lot of good things.
