

SIOUX FALLS — South Dakota will have a different entrant into the 'Big Dance.' Here come the Coyotes to

League championship game. After rallying from a 17point deficit to beat Western Illinois in the first round, USD turned around and rolled past five-time league champion South Dakota State in the semifinals. "It's not surprisng at all to me for them to be in the championship game," Denver coach Kerry Cremeans said. "They've been a force late in the conference season."

The Covotes were especially strong down the stretch of a tight affair.

After having led by just one point at halftime, USD took the lead back for good on a three-pointer by Raeshel Contreras with 8:49 to play. Within five minutes, the

Coyote lead was in double figures, and from there they were able to start the celebration in front of 4,125 fans.

As has been the norm with USD this season, it was particularly balanced in the title game. Six players reached double figures, with Contreras (13), Margaret Mc-Cloud (10), Bridget Arens (10) and Tia Hemiller (10) having big games.

It wasn't long after the final that the questions of where USD could find itself in the NCAA Tournament started propping up.

"It's definitely exciting. Once we find out who we play, we can refocus,' Seekamp said. "We're going to cherish this moment for a few days, and get back on the road and hopefully get a few more wins.

And yes, USD plans to savor the moment. Williams joked that the program "will not hide" the success from recruits.
