Raiders Fall In Tourney Debut

HURON — Late in the first quarter, Sully Buttes head coach Mark Senftner decided that his team wasn't getting things done. Unfortunately for Gayville-Volin, his Chargers team got things straightened out.

Top-seeded Sully Buttes outscored Gayville-Volin 53-21 after that first quarter time out, rolling past the Raiders 65-31 in the opening round of the S.D. State Class B Girls' Basketball Tournament on Thursday at Huron

The victory sends the Chargers (22-1) to a semifinal matchup with defending state champion Warner (22-2) Friday at 6 p.m. Gayville-Volin (15-8) will look to bounce back at noon against Lemmon (22-2).

Karlea Stahl struggled from the line, making just six of 15 free throw attempts, but still finished with 16 points to lead a balanced Sully Buttes attack. Remi Wientjes had 15 points, Chloe Lamb netted 13 points and Racquel Wientjes scored 10 points off the bench in the victory.

Genny Clark scored 12 points to lead Gayville-Volin.

Sully Buttes took advantage of some Raider offensive struggles to take an early 7-2 lead, but two free throws and a three-pointer by Clark tied the game at seven.

"We got some good looks, but had some missed oppor-tunities," said Gayville-Volin head coach Matt Malloy. "When we did get into what we wanted to run, we had some success."

The Chargers scored the next five points, but Laura Nelson got loose for a threepointer for Gayville-Volin, prompting Senftner's time out.

"We weren't matching up. We weren't doing a good job of switching and communication," Senftner said. "I knew that if we let them get in rhythm, we'd be in trouble.'

The Chargers responded to the time out with a defensive barrage, holding Gayville-Volin to three field

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) — Austin Hollins scored 18 points, Deandre Mathieu added 13 and Andre Hollins hit a late 3-pointer Thursday to give Minnesota a badly needed 63-56 win over Penn State in the Big Ten tournament.

The seventh-seeded Golden Gophers (20-12) advanced to Friday night's quarterfinal against No. 12 Wisconsin with their third win in four games.

10th-seeded Penn State (15-17) had a miserable night shooting, making only 32.2 percent from the field. D.J. Newbill had 16 points

and senior Tim Frazier added 11. Penn State heads home from Indianapolis after losing for the third time in four games.

Minnesota took control quickly with a 9-0 lead and never trailed. Penn State got within three just

before halftime and within 58-54 with 2:35 to go, but Andre Hollins made a free throw and hit the 3 in the final minute to close it out.

The big question now is whether this win will convince the selection committee Minnesota belongs in the tourney?

Most outsiders thought Min-

nesota needed at least one win at Bankers Life Fieldhouse to give them a shot at one of the 36 precious at-large bids and beating the Badgers for the second time this season would certainly help. As it stands now, the Gophers have three wins this season over the Nittany Lions but are just 5-10 against the rest of the league. It does have two wins over Top 25 teams, but both came at home. USD Volleyball Coach Leaves For Minnesota

VERMILLION — The University of South Dakota has another head coaching vacancy.

After leading the Coyote volleyball program to 97 wins in his six seasons, head coach Matt Houk is leaving to become an assistant at Minnesota, USD announced Thurs-

In its same release, USD announced that associate head coach Leanne (Felsing) Williamson will become the interim head coach to replace Houk — who moves into a Gophers program that annually ranks



in the top 25. "It was unique in the sense that I wasn't out looking for anything. My family and I were very happy and feeling good about USD," Houk said Thursday. "But when I got the call, it was obviously something we had to consider."

Such a quick transition from Houk to Williamson (in the interim) to bridge the gap figures to help the program continue moving forward, Williamson — who has been Houk's assistant for five years — said. 'That was a relief for the play-

ers, you could see it," she said, "knowing this could be a pretty seamless transition.

"Every one of them knows me, and they know not much would change," she added. "I think that gives them a little bit of relief from the stress of the unknown."

Houk, whose 97-85 record with USD ranks as the best winning percentage (.533) in school history, helped transition the Coyotes from a struggling Division II program into a regional force on the D-I scene.

He was especially successful against rival South Dakota State, winning the last seven matches against the Jackrabbits dating back to the 2010 season.
